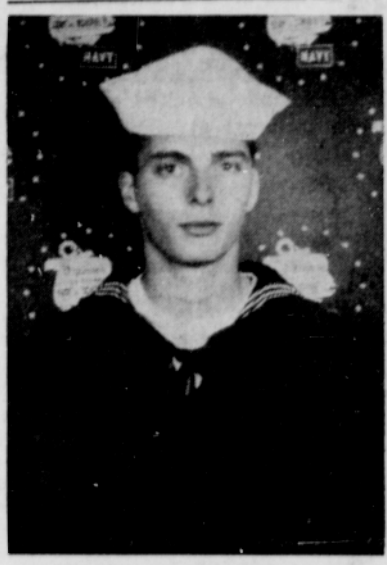

### SOCIAL SECURITY

QUESTION: I have some timber on my land. If someone cuts this down for me, can the income be counted toward social security self-employment income?

ANSWER: No. Standing timber is a capital asset and income derived from its sale is capital gain only.

QUESTION: Can we apply for surplus food at the social security office?

ANSWER: No. The surplus food program is handled through your county welfare office and all inquiries should be made there.

QUESTION: May I draw benefits on my late husband's social security account? After he died I received a Lump-Sum Death Payment of \$180.00 and was told by some friends that I am, therefore, not eligible for monthly benefits. I was 62 years old in July.

ANSWER: Yes—you are eligible for widow's benefits beginning with July when you were 62. The Lump-Sum is payable at time of death and monthly benefits to widows when they are 62. Under the recent amendments, a widow may receive 82½ per cent of her husband's social security each month.

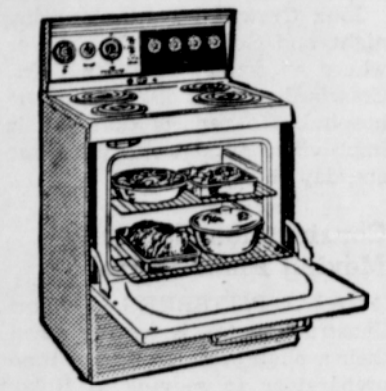

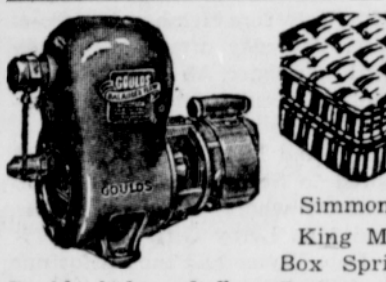

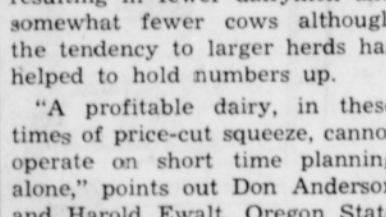

Rapid changes taking place in the dairy industry in Columbia county, as well as the state, are resulting in fewer dairymen and somewhat fewer cows although the tendency to larger herds has helped to hold numbers up.

"A profitable dairy, in these times of price-cut squeeze, cannot operate on short time planning alone," points out Don Anderson and Harold Ewalt, Oregon State University dairy specialists. They state that, "it is the annual production and year after year high production that really pays the bills and returns more net profit. Knowing the average production per cow based on total herd production does no real good. Ten per cent of the animals in a herd may be 'free riders' that could be removed and net profit increased with certainly less feed and labor being involved. Why is the production of all cows in Oregon 7060 pounds of milk while the average of cows on DHIA is 9603 pounds? At \$4.00 per cwt. this amounts to a return of \$100 more per cow. The simple answer seems to be that those dairymen with production records used them for a better feeding, culling and management program with the result being more net income."

Exhibits at the county fair and the comments of the many folks trying some of the Oregon State University test selections, certainly indicates that this is not the year of the green tomato.

In the more favored locations almost everyone has had fair success with all varieties of tomatoes. In the cooler areas, some of the Oregon State University selections are doing quite well. For instance Jess Skeans is having good results this year on their farm at Fern Hill. Jess says in the past it was possible to get ripe tomatoes only in the most favorable years and it isn't often that all conditions are right. This year eight Oregon State University selections were put out with black polyethylene plastic.

Sweet corn is a prominent Oregon crop. Last year we ranked fourth among all the states in sweet corn for processing compared with eighth in 1951.

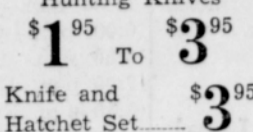

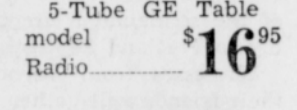

## AROUND THE FARM By DON COIN WALROD County Extension Agent

Oregon's 1961 sweet corn acreage for processing is 26 per cent above last year and 81 per cent above the 10-year average. With the increased acreage, perhaps we will rank still higher in corn production this year.

When it comes to corn-on-the-cob, quality and flavor is obtained when it is eaten minutes after harvest. Most folks can't achieve such rapid use of the product unless they have their own gardens or live near producers. Next best is to use corn immediately after purchase. Quality deteriorates rapidly if the ears are held in the refrigerator for more than a day.

The sweetness of corn on the cob disappears rapidly as the sugar is used up in the respiration process which continues for some time after harvest. Refrigeration helps to cut down respiration rates and maintains quality. At 70 degrees, sweet corn will lose 50 per cent of its sweetness within 24 hours.

Emphasizing further the importance of fall fertilization, research has shown that with the exception of nitrogen, leaching losses of plant nutrients ordinarily needed are nil or negligible. This includes phosphorus, potash, boron, sulfur and lime.

With the exception of lime, it is not advisable to fall fertilize fields intended for spring planting. It is best to get lime on in the summer or fall so it can be mixed with the surface soil when the seed bed is prepared.

Although our climate is such that we never will be an important grape production area, trial plantings made with Jess Cronin, Scappoose, reveal some varieties that ripen and may be worthy of consideration as table grapes. One of these is Cardinal, a grape about the size and color of Tokay but with a different flavor. Jess reports this one has been ripe for two or three weeks now.

Another possible table grape is Perle De Scaba, a white grape with a most interesting flavor and the size of Niagara.

## County Issues 48 Building Permits In August for Total of \$713,582.40

An itemized statistical report released this week in the county shows that 48 building permits were issued in the county in the month of August. Prior to August, 74 permits had been issued for a total to the end of August of 122.

Value of the permits issued in August was \$713,582.40 and for those prior to August, \$399,260. Total valuation of permits granted since the regulation went into effect is \$1,112,842.40.

Breakdown of the figures to show what permits were issued for shows that in August, 4 were for septic tanks valued at \$1,250; 16 were for single family dwellings valued at \$106,800; four were for miscellaneous items valued at \$1,065; two were for new industrial construction valued at \$594,950; 16 were for alterations to single family homes, amounting to \$7,685 and six were for construction of detached garages in the amount of \$1,832.40.

To date, the permits issued and their value is as follows: Septic tanks, 15, \$4,595; single family residences, 43, \$407,400; miscellaneous, 8, \$16,865; new commercial, 1, \$23,000; new industrial, 2, \$594,950; additions or alterations to single family homes, 42, \$61,925; detached garages, 11, \$4,107.

The report fails to reflect various repairs to roofs, steps and alterations, due to the fact many contractors and owners don't realize that the code covers such items.

A short form of the building code is available at two dollars. Another pamphlet giving the requirements of the code in less technical terms and including diagrams and charts is also available for one dollar.
