QUESTION: I estimated my earnings for this year to be \$1600. If I get a \$200 bonus at the end of this year, what effect will it have on my payments?

ANSWER: The bonus you receive will cause an overpayment of benefits unless you report it promptly. It's important that you report getting this bonus and revise your estimate as soon as possible to avoid any large overpayment.

QUESTION: I am over 65 and have been getting social security checks. Now I have a chance to go back to work. I have two questions: First, will I have to pay social security on what I make? Second, if I do, will it raise my check after I quit?

ANSWER: You must keep on paying the social security tax whenever you work. There is no age limit. If you make enough to raise the average upon which your social security check is based, you may get a larger check.

QUESTION: While attending college this year, I will be employed part time by my father and uncle who operate a warehouse in partnership. Since I am under the age of 21, will my work be covered under the Social Security Act and will I need a social security card?

ANSWER: Yes. Service performed by a child under 21 in the employ of a partnership is covered if it is not a partnership composed of both parents, or a natural parent and a step-parent. You will need a social security card when you go to work, regardless of your age.

QUESTION: I will be 72 years old in October and I've been receiving some monthly benefits each year. In the past, I have always had to make an estimate of my earnings at the end of the year if I made over \$1200. This year I will earn about \$1400, but since I will be 72 this year, do I still have to report my earnings?

ANSWER: Yes, you are required to report your earnings after the close of the year, even though you are 72 years old, in order that the Social Security Administration can determine if you are eligible for any benefits for the months before you were 72.

QUESTION: A quarter of coverage is a term used by social security to measure the amount of work done by an individual. For social security purposes, the year is divided into four quarters. If you are an employee, the payment of \$50 in wages in a quarter gives you social security credit for that quarter. You need a certain number of credits to become eligible for social security payments.

QUESTION: I am a factory worker. How are my social security credits reported and how can I find out if I am receiving proper credit for my work under social security?

ANSWER: A worker's earnings under social security are reported by his employer after the end of each calendar quarter. It is very easy to check the accuracy of your social security account. All you need to do is obtain a postal card form (OAR-7004) from any social security office, fill it out, and drop it in the mail. You will be sent a record of your official social security account.

QUESTION: I have a heart condition and am not able to work full time. I do raise cattle on my brother's land and he receives a share of the profit. I am 53 years old and my profit last year was \$800. Am I a farmer, or not?

ANSWER: If under a crop-sharing arrangement, you undertake to produce a crop or raise livestock on your land, or land belonging to someone else, and your net profit is \$400 or more, you are a self-employed farmer. You must file a tax return and pay social security tax. You may not owe any income tax, depending on your profit, but you do owe social security tax.

QUESTION: I am retiring from teaching soon. My son encouraged me to wait to apply for social security benefits then, but I feel I should wait until age 65. Which is most advantageous?

ANSWER: Not knowing your age and average earnings over the past several years, we are unable to estimate your benefit payments; however, generally it averages out that a person taking reduced benefits at age 62 will receive about the same amount of money in a lifetime as the person taking full benefits at age 65.
