QUESTION: We have just recently adopted a child who was receiving social security. We'd be interested in knowing how the adoption may affect this payment. We are not related to the parents of this child.

ANSWER: The adoption of a child by a non-relative will terminate the child's entitlement to benefits. A child adopted by an aunt, uncle, step-parent or grandparent after the death of the worker would not terminate benefits to which the child had already become entitled.

QUESTION: I have been living at the same address since I got my social security card 10 years ago. I will be moving next month. How do I go about changing my address with social security?

ANSWER: You are not required to report such a change of address unless you are receiving social security benefits.

QUESTION: When I got married, I told my husband I was two years younger than I actually am. Now that we are making our claim for social security, will he find out I lied

ANSWER: Not unless you want him to. You may arrange to be interviewed separately from your husband so that he may not hear you tell us your date of birth.

QUESTION: I got a social security card years ago but have misplaced it. I know the number by heart and have been reciting it from memory to past employers. My present employer insists on seeing the card. What shall I do?

ANSWER: Request a duplicate card from your social security office. The Social Security Administration urges all employers to copy the name and social security number of each new employee from the card to prevent any possible error that might occur when people give the wrong number from memory.

QUESTION: How much wages must a farm worker be paid in order to receive a quarter of coverage?

ANSWER: Farm workers earn a quarter of coverage for each \$100 that they are paid in cash wages in a calendar year. If a farm worker is paid cash wages amounting to \$400 in a calendar year, he may be credited with four quarters of coverage

QUESTION: I am planning to file for my social security benefits next year but I worked for the railroad for four years in the 1940's. Will 1 receive credit under social security for this railroad work?

ANSWER: Yes. Your railroad earnings will be transferred to your social security account at the time you file your claim. They will be used as credit toward your insured status under social security.

Unique Class Will Be Given

The 4-H participants in this year's Oregon state fair, September 4 to 12, will chalk up another educational "first" when they enter their livestock in a unique carcass evaluation class, according to Cal Monroe, Oregon State University, state 4-H extension agent.

In a departure from the traditional method of awarding prizes to animals for their appearance "on the hoof," 4-H club members who wish to do so can enter their animals in the carcass evaluation class where they will be judged according to their actual meat value.

According to Monroe, this is the first time that such a class has been offered at state fair for all classes of meat animals. The class will be somewhat similar to the carcass classes recently inaugurated at the Portland International Livestock Ex-

The cattle, sheep and hog carcass evaluation classes will be open to animals owned by any 4-H member. The animals also may be entered in the showmanship contest prior to the carcass exhibit if the owners wish to do so.

An evaluation of the live animals will be held September 9 at 4 p.m. All breeds will show together. Animals will then be taken to Mount Angel for slaughter, and the carcasses judged and displayed September 12 at 9 a.m. John Landers, OSU animal science specialist, will supervise the carcass evaluation exhibit.

The new state fair class is in line with the continuing trend by livestock producers to breed and feed animals to meet consumer demand for more tender meat with less waste fat. Landers points out the difference in market value of the carcass is determined in part by the amount of excess fat.

A beef carcass is made up of skelton, fat and muscle. The relative proportion of muscle and fat can be changed through breeding and feeding for lean, high quality meat type

This will be one of the first 4-H livestock carcass evaluation classes to be offered in the nation. It should afford a valuable educational opportunity to 4-H livestock club members who intend to raise livestock as career, says Monroe.

For further details on entering livestock in the carcass evaluation class, 4-H club members should contact their county extension agent.
