Advice Offered On Watering

trees ,shrubs and lawns require large quantities of water, points out Columbia County Agent Tom Zinn. Before you water, think of how much water you will apply on each area. The soil is like a sponge in certain respects. It can only take water in at a certain rate. A heavy watering of one-half inch per hour will be wasteful and do little good to the

The best way to do the watering job is the right way advises Zinn. Tests have shown that lawns should be watered at the rate of one-fourth inch of water each hour or possibly less. One inch of water, which would be a four hour setting would sufficiently soak the lawn. Watering rates greater than one-fourth inch per hour, will run off and do no good.

Flower beds and vegetable gardens should receive similar water treatment. A weekly watering should be adequate, however, if the weather stays farm and dry, as it has lately, then more frequent watering may be necessary, says Zinn.

Insect and disease problems that are quite frequent this time of year are listed along with the control measures, as follows:

Cottony Camellia Scale & Lecanium Scale - The Cottony Camellia Scale at this time of the year is in aid in controlling rose dust. the egg mass, observed as a cottony mass about 1/4 inch long. The Lecanium Scale is a large, turtle-shaped scale. Both scales get on the same plants. Any one of the following insecticides can be used to control these insect plants, Diazon, Sevin, or Malathion. The most favorable period for centrol is during late July or early August after the eggs have hatched, and while the insect is in the young crawler stage.

Cherry and Rose Slugs - These larvae of Saw Flies are black, shiny appearing tadpole - shaped larvae about 1/2 inch long, which skeletonize leaves on cherries, hawthorns, pears, plums, roses, etc. Control these insect pests with DDT, Malathion, or Diazinon. Remeber that all insecticides should be used according to manufacturer's directions.

Black Pollen Beetles - These are small, black, oval, shiny beetles

With the continued hot dry weather about one-eighth inch long, found in blossoms from mid-July to mid-August. They are difficult to control because of the prolonged migration period, and constant reinfestation. Malathion, DDT, or Lindane can be

Azalea Leaf Gall - This is a fungus disease causing either all or part of a leaf to became thickened, fleshy, and be covered with a white bloom of spores. At first the diseased leaves are succulent, white in color, but later turning to hard, brown, gall-like bodies. Control measures include removing and burning the galls and spraying with either Fer-

Rose Powdery Mildew - A fungus disease causing white, powdery fungus growth on young leaves, shoots, and buds - distortion of growth is common. The disease can develop under relatively dry conditions. Climbers, ramblers and hybrid tea roses are susceptible.

Control measures at this time of the year include spraying every seven to ten days with wettable sulfur and Karathane, or dusting with sulfur or sulfur-Ferbam. Follow directions on any and all of these materials. The sulfur spray, sulfur dust and sulfur-Ferbam will aid in controlling Blackspot. They will also



Jones, a building contractor, completed a new house and shortly thereafter it was purchased by a young couple, Mike and Martha Smith.

The Smiths had not been in their new home for more than a few months when large cracks appeared in the basement floor. The cracks were so large that water seeped directly upward and onto the basement floor.

In the process of having the cracks repaired, it was discovered that large holes had been left in the backfill around the foundation. Pieces of timber and other debris were found in the holes, preventing solid settling of the earth around the foundation. Large pockets of water had developed in the holes, and were seeping through the basement floor.

The Smiths asked the contractor to pay for the repairs to their basement floor. He refused, saying the buyer of a house takes it as is.

Did the Smiths have a valid basis for a lawsuit?

the buyer and the builder-seller, it is risks involved. more equitable that the loss resulting from negligent construction, in a case of a concealed defect, should be borne by the builder rather than by the buyer.

If the defect had been obvious instead of concealed, as it was in this case, the Smiths might have had no basis for their lawsuit. This is because, if the buyer knowingly accepts a defective performance by the contractor, he has waived the

It is your duty to remonstrate with the driver, and in extreme cases, you must leave the vehicle at the first available opportunity or do whatever is necessary in the exercise of reas-


