Mrs. Violet Tucker and Bill Mulkey entertained 39 guests Sunday afternoon at a barbecue.

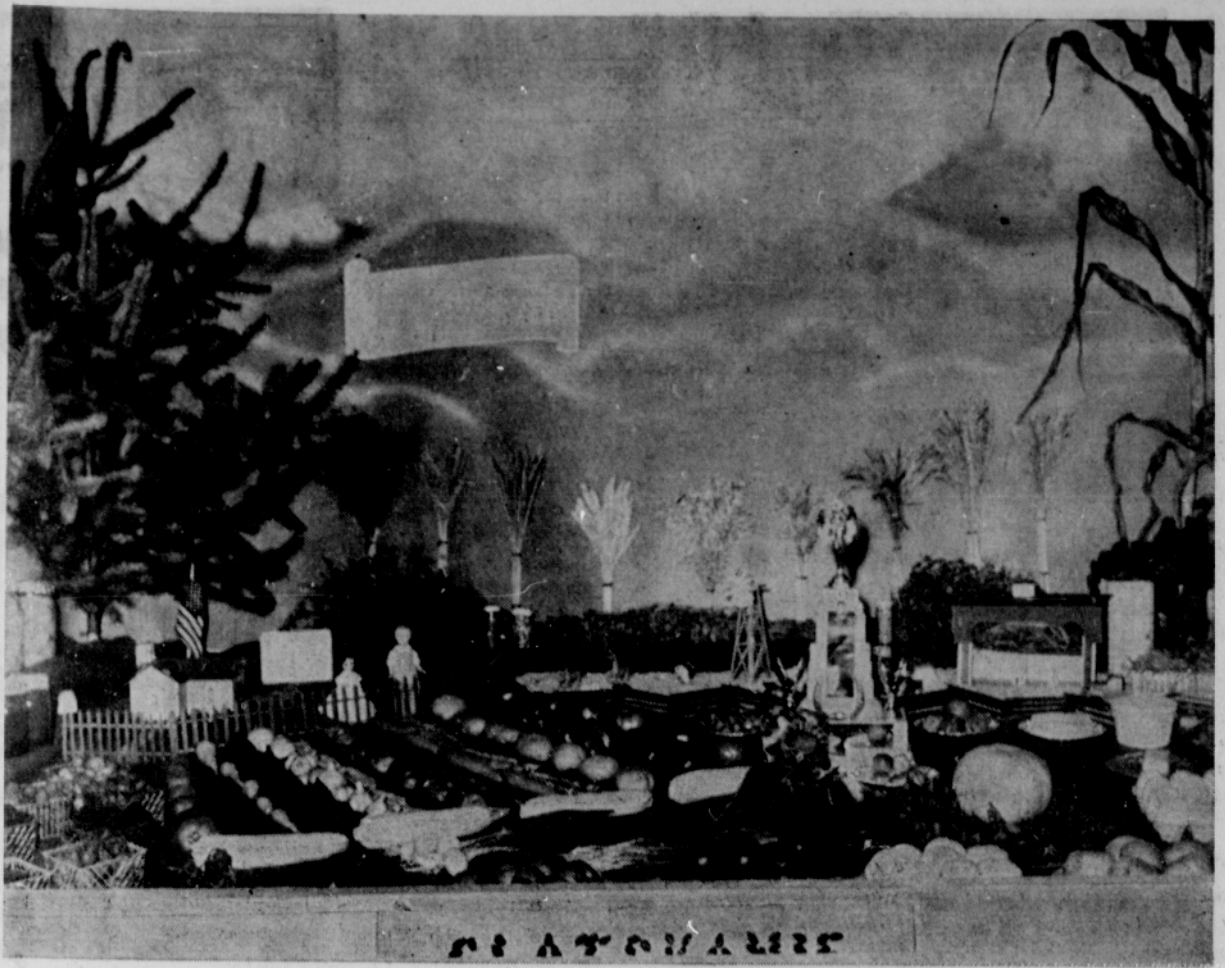
Fair Proves Attraction For Friday Evening

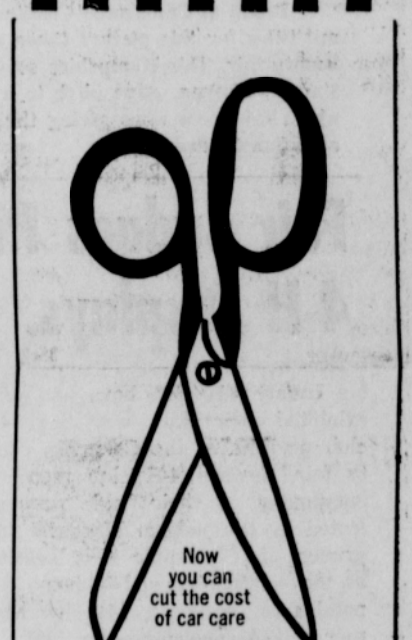
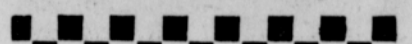

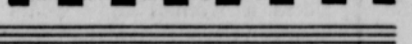
