> QUESTION: Will there be many youths trained under the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962 during the coming season?

ANSWER: During 1963, 24 percent of trainees attending regular classes were youths under 22 years of age. Courses approved for this fall are two special youth programs - 250 trainees in logger training at North Bend and a multiple occupation program at Eugene. The North Bend course for logging entry workers will draw 250 trainees from various parts of the state. The training will be given at Southwestern Oregon College.

A multiple occupation program at Eugene will train up to 350 trainees in occupations in short supply in Lane county. The latter training will be at Eugene Technical school. More than 900 persons in Oregon are expected to be in training this fall under MDTA.

Don Cadwell, special representative of the Oregon AFL-CIO will emphasize the necessity of a maximum registration of voters prior to October 3 so that they may take part in this decision, November 3 when voters will consider proposed amendments to the state's workmen's compensation (job-injury) law.




