Sunset Tours Sets Rail Date


A brilliant display of nature's autumn colors will be the feature attraction of a rail excursion from Portland to Goldendale, Washington on Sunday, October 18. Sponsored by Sunset Tours, a department of the non-profit Vernonia, South Park & Sunset Steam Railroad, the special train will leave N.W. 10th and Hoyt streets, at 8:00 a.m., DST, and will return at 7:30 p.m.

It will operate over the tracks of the SP&S railway, along the north bank of the Columbia as far is Lyle, Washington where the mouth of the Klickitat river is located. From this point the "Fall Foilage Special" enters the narrow gorge of the Klickitat following that stream to Swale Creek canyon where it will climb to the uplands through a stand of deciduous trees and colorful rock formations.

At Goldendale, county seat of Klickitat county, excursionists will be taken in special buses to Maryhill Museum and Stonehenge Monument for a look at some of the treasures given by Queen Marie of Roumania and the first Great War Memorial erected in the United States Equipment on the train will consist of standard coaches, a baggage car where snacks are served and an open-top observation car for a panoramic view of the entire route. Included in the fare of \$9.95 (children 5 through 11, \$5.95) will be a chicken box lunch as well as the side trip to the museum, including admission. Tickets are available at Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Union Depot ticket offices in Portland or by mail from Sunset Tours, 2765 S.W. 119th Avenue, Beaverton, enclosing a stamped, selfaddressed envelope.

Unemployment **Hits Low Point**

The rate of insured unemployment for the week ending September 24, at 2.0 percent, is lower than for any comparable week since 1956, David H. Cameron, commissioner, Oregon Department of Employment reported.

Also for the week ending September 5, the average insured unemployment rate for the United States was 2.6 compared to Oregon's 2.0 percent.

Four weeks earlier as well as a vear earlier the rate was at 2.1 percent. The only area experiencing substantial unemployment was The Dalles with 6.7 percent where a labor - management dispute involving plumbers' locals tied up construction at the John Day Dam. However, the settlement of this dispute early this week is expected to relieve this situation, Cameron said.
