## OSU Plan Service Offers Farm Aids

Three new free building plans are now available from Oregon State University plan service to assist farmers, reports Columbia County Extension Agent Don Coin Walrod.

Buildings plan 86 is a utility flat bed trailer designed for hauling tractors and other farm machinery. The bed tilts.

Building plan 85, a hoof trimming table for turning an animal on its side, has proved very successful at Oregon State University for handling beef cattle.

Building plan 88 contains suggestions for cattle hay bunks for use when feeding long hay. It can also be used for chopped hay but is primarily designed for long hay to avoid excessive waste.

Copies of the plans may be secured from county extension offices.
