## Expenses for Month Totaled

The Columbia County Public Welfare Commission, Roy K. Smith, administrator, reports the following expenditures for the month ending September 30, 1964:

General assistance, \$2,110.91; foster care, \$22,524.58; aid to dependent children, \$9,816.60; aid to the blind, \$328.64; aid to the disabled, \$4,667.41; medical aid to the aged, \$4,351.96. Total expenditures, \$32,669.07.

The expenditures from the county funds were \$4,268.51, from the state funds \$9,959.87, and from the federal funds \$18,440.69. In Columbia county, 1,967 persons were eligible for the surplus food program and 841 persons made use of this service.

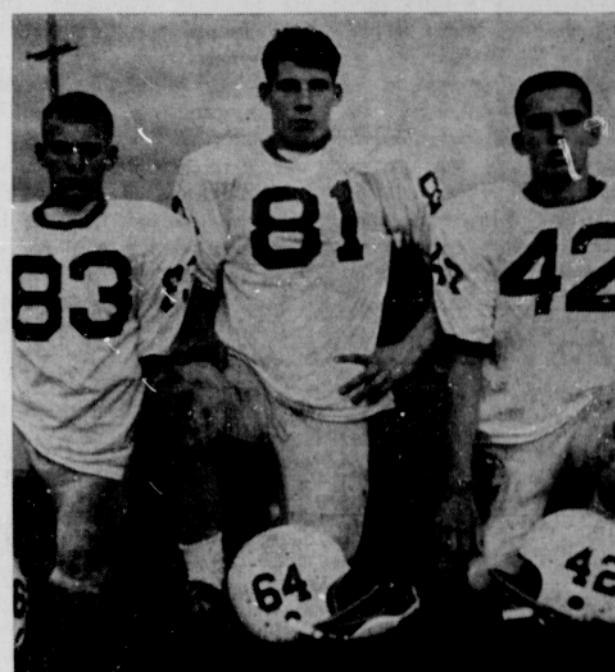
