Grass Control Raises Yield

Winter wheat yields can be increased by controlling annual grasses, declares County Extension Agent Don Coin Walrod. Depending upon the grass problem yield increases can amount to as much as 12 or 15 bushels per acre. If grasses are not a problem, particularly ryegrass, the field should not be sprayed.

Diuron, generally known as karmex DW, is the recommended herbicide, says Walrod. Fields can be sprayed either before or after the wheat has emerged. However, with heavier rains imminent at this time of year, the best plan is to spray immediately after planting the wheat.

Control of annual grasses is particularly important in short strawed Gaines wheat and in fields where heavier rates of nitrogen will be used to boost yield, states Walrod.

Law Effective On Seat Belts

Oregon's law requiring seat belts or harnesses in the front seats of all new passenger cars sold in the state goes into effect November 1, according to Vern L. Hill, director of the department of motor vehicles.

The new law, passed by the 1963 legislature, says, in effect, that no person shall offer for sale a new passenger automobile that has seating for one or more passengers beside the driver unless the vehicle is equipped with seat belts or harnesses in the front seat. The belts or harnesses must meet minimum standards and specifications adopted by the department of motor vehicles.

Hill noted that the law actually requires only two seat belts or harnesses, and recommended vehicles that normally carry additional passengers should also have belts installed for every passenger position to provide protection for all occupants.

The law also requires that seat belts installed in used vehicles must be of a type approved by the department. The department specifications require that manufacturers of belts must have their product approved according to standards of the Society of Automotive Engineers as adopted by the department.

If in doubt as to whether a particular brand or type of seat belt has departmental approval, prospective purchasers are advised to write the vehicle equipment section of the department of motor vehicles, Salem.

In Oregon so far in 1964, nearly 30 percent of those killed in traffic accidents died when they were thrown from the vehicle in which they were riding. "Seat belts", said Hill, "certainly would have saved the lives of many of these."

Workers for Ag Census Named

Enumerators have been named in Columbia county for the 1964 Census of Agriculture, crew leader Robert L. Glosenger said recently.

Enumerators in Columbia county belong to a force of 23,000 throughout the nation employed temporarily by the U.S. Bureau of the Census for this year's Census of Agriculture.

Enumerators are key workers in an agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U.S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and improvements, farm products sold, and on some production expenditures. Information also will be collected on use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

The enumerators will be trained in a special four-day home study course designed to prepare them for the farm census, their crew leader said.

Sam Hearing Sr. has been appointed to take the survey in the Vernonia area.

Goodwill Aid by Scouts Begins Saturday with Collection Drive

Boy Scouts of America, Portland Area Council will again answer the call to help Goodwill Industries in the collection of discarded clothing and small housewares. The 1964 drive by the scouts will take place on two Saturdays — November 7 and 14.

It is expected, said a Boy Scout spokesman, that some 25,000 Boy Scouts, Cubs, and Senior Scouts will fan out over twelve counties in Oregon and southern Washington in the mammoth drive for discarded but usable clothing. Nearly 1,000 troops, packs and dens will participate, visiting 230,000 homes in the area.

The Rotary Club of East Portland have been sponsors for the drive since the beginning in 1952. Rotary members volunteer and man trucks for moving the collected materials into Goodwill's plant, and these men provide much of the muscle for unloading and stacking in the plant.

Fire departments in both Portland and outlying cities give vital help in two ways: by permitting use of their fire houses as distributing points for the empty Good Turn bags to the Scout units, and for use as

collection depots for the bags with contributed materials.

Scouts distribute empty bags to householder for one week, starting November 7. Bags remain with the household discards. Then, a week later, Saturday, November 14, Scouts return to collect the bags. The Scouts ask that bags be placed on front porches early so they can complete the collection by noon.

The yearly clothing collection drive by the Scouts serves a double purpose: to obtain materials needed by Goodwill to maintain jobs and the job training for their young men and women; and to enable Goodwill to reach out to serve those uncapped people who need and have been waiting for the services Goodwill can provide.

Since the Good Turn for Goodwill clothing drives by the Boy Scouts began in 1952, Goodwill has more than tripled the number of handicapped people served, said Marion C. Smith, executive director of Goodwill Industries.

Soil, Water Districts Slate Annual Meeting Next Week

Water resources development, public relations and conservation will be key topics for the 16th annual meeting of the Oregon Association of Soil and Water Conservation districts at Portland Wednesday through Friday, November 11-13, according to Elmer Peterson, Sauvie Island dairyman and association president.

The meeting opens Wednesday with the eighth annual state soil judging contest at Fernwood Grange just east of Newberg. Sponsors of the contest are the association, Oregon State University Cooperative Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service and Pacific Supply Cooperative.

Registration for the meeting itself opens Thursday morning in the lobby of the Sheraton Motor Inn, site of all regular meetings. Peterson will preside over the opening assembly during which delegates from Oregon's conservative districts will be welcomed to Portland by Mayor Terry Schrunk.

State Rep. Hugh McGilvra, Forest Grove will moderate the panel discussion on water resource development in Oregon, one of the major program topics of the day.

Appearing on the panel will be W. H. Stewart, Portland, chief of basin planning, U. S. Army Engineers; A. J. Webber, state conservationist; Soil Conservation Service; F. E. Waggoner, Lane county surveyor; Donel Lane, Salem, executive secretary, State Water Resources Board and John Mangán, Salem, Bureau of Reclamation area engineer.

Sen. Wayne L. Morse will speak at the Thursday luncheon. Banquet speaker that night will be Dr. Frank Bennett, long-time president of Eastern Oregon College until his retirement Sept. 1. He will discuss conservation education.

Public relations in agriculture will be the lead-off topic for the final day's session. Kirby Brumfield Jr., of KATU-TV, Channel 2, will moderate the discussion.

Appearing on the panel will be M. J. Frey, publisher, The Oregonian; Paul Alexander, farm director for radio stations KPOJ, Portland, and KUIK, Hillsboro; Irven H. Luiten, Portland, public affairs manager for Weyerhaeuser; Glenn Simmons, Glenwood, State Grange; Richard Wayman, Bend, Midstate conservation district chairman, and Robert Mc-
