Church Influence on Community Vernonia Eagle Noted by Local Minister Group

(Editors note: The Vernonia Ministerial Association presents this article written by one of its members as an evaluation of the influence of the church in the community.)

THE INFLUENCE OF THE CHURCH

By Rev. Raymond P. Targgart It is very difficult to evaluate the influence of the church in a community. One of the most effective ways to do this would be that of discontinuing all activities of the church, Sunday school, young peoples' meetings and listening to any religious broadcast on radio and TV for a period of two years, in any given community

There are very few people who would care to live in a community, city or country where there were no churches. One is not always conscious of all the comforts and conveniences of his home until it has been destroyed by fire, wind or earthquake. When this takes place he is suddenly conscious of the value of the fellowship of their companions until one of them is taken. So it is with the church and all of its accompanying activities. We are not fully appreciative of its presence and availability until it no longer exists. So much for the negative side of the

Statistics are many times very dry and uninteresting but they do give a comparative view of this influence in a most graphic manner. From the most reliable records available, it is disclosed that 90 percent of the men behind prison bars teday are from homes of non-church-going people. When one girl 16 years of age was brought before a juvenile judge he remarked, "Why did not the parents of this girl keep her in Sunday school. Sunday school girls seldom come to see me.

Of 2700 boys brought before one judge, only a very small percentage of them had been regular attendants at any Sunday school. Of 1700 boys brought before another judge only one had come from a home where family worship was observed.

The American Sunday School Union, which has been in existence for almost 150 years, makes this statement and uses it occasionally in a slogan, "Bring up a child in Sunday school and he won't be brought up in court." Somebody has very aptly stated, "Make good use of the little

authorities will not have to use the electric chair."

There are 6,000,000 criminals listed in the department of justice in Washington, D.C. Not many of these will be found enrolled as devoted attendants of Sunday school and church. According to reliable sources more than 90 percent of the boys and girls who attend Sunday school regularly never get into serious trouble. Of the 160 robberies, 100 burglaries, 500 auto thefts, and 2500 larcenies which are committed each day, few are committed by regular attendants at Sunday school and church.

The following statistics taken from the records of two families involved give a vivid picture of the church's influence. Several generations ago there lived in the state of New York a man and his wife who had nothing to do with the church and its activities nor its author, God; they were atheists. After several generations had passed a study was made of over a thousand descendants of this couple. There were 300 who died prematurely, 100 were sent to penal institutions for an average of 13 years each; 190 were public prostitutes, 100 were drunkards. They cost the state of New York, \$1,200,000 in crimes

In the same state lived a godly man and his wife, Rev. and Mrs. Jonathan Edwards. A study was made of over 700 of their descendants with these findings: 300 were ministers of the gospel, 65 were college professors, 13 were university presidents, 60 were authors of good books and of all the others only one was found with a questionable character. They cost the state nothing for crimes; on the other hand, they were making constructive contributions to

Jim and I were pals, close pals of the David and Jonathan type, but we were sinners, away from God, in our early twenties. In the providence of God I was led into a camp meeting conducted by the church. There I was converted and have just completed 47 years of service for Ged. Jim missed the trail, (got into the wrong crowd) became a bootlegger and a thief. In trying to make a fast get-away one night after a robbery, he ran into the back end of a truck with his old jalopy and was killed instantly. Had Jim been as fortunate as I, there might have been recorded 94 years of service for the Lord instead of 47.

Only God can possibly know the entire influence of the church upon a community


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
