Balls of Yarn Club Continues Knitting

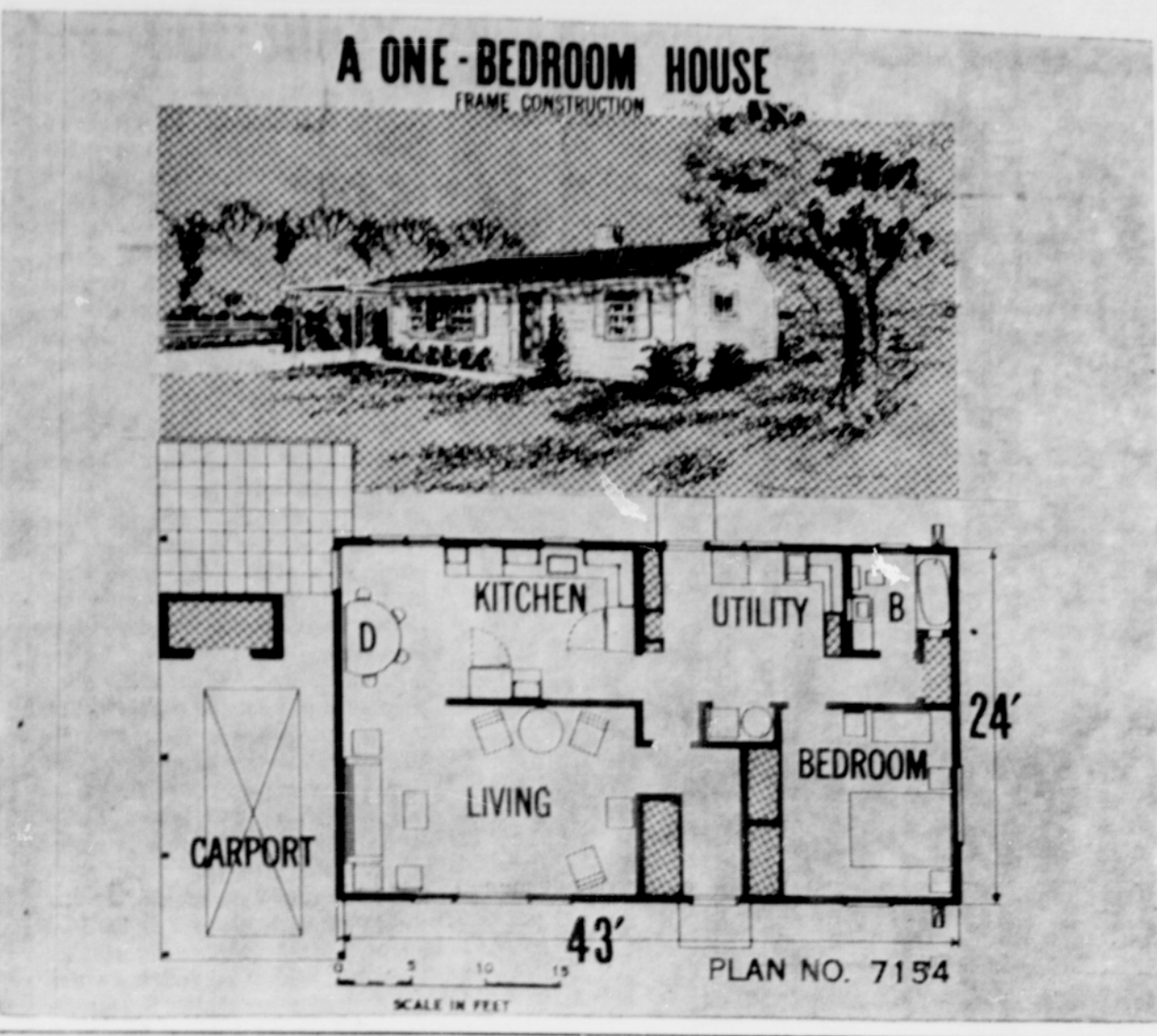

Small Family House Drawn

This efficient house for the smaller family features a frame construction with concrete slab-on-grade and trussed roof. It provides living space for retired persons or a young couple.

The bedroom is separated from the living and kitchen areas and is sound cushioned from the entrance hall by closet walls. A second bedroom could be added with the entrance through the space now occupied by the linen closet.

A work room with modern equipment and storage areas is located near the kitchen, bathroom, and rear entrance. This provides a place for hanging work clothes and washing up before entering other areas of the house. There is sufficient floor space for sewing, ironing, and children's play. For the older family, the space could serve for hobbies.
