New Post Office Design Accepted by GSA

The General Service Administration has announced acceptance of design for the new United States Post Office and Federal Office Building in Scappoose.

Designed by the architectural firm of Stanton, Boles, Maguire and Church of Portland, the one-story building, approximately 63 by 97 feet on a site 200 by 200 feet, will have

exterior walls of reinforced concrete with applied cement stucco finish. Interior partitions are concrete masonry units and gypsum wallboard on steel stud framing.

There will be a paved parking area for convenience of the postal patrons. Estimated construction cost will be \$125,700. Word about details of the

new building was received here Tuesday morning from Maurine B. Neuberger, U.S. Senator.

THE PUBLIC WELFARE ?

Questions about public welfare which are of general interest are answered in this column as a public service. Help with individual problems is available at your county welfare office.

What is case classification?
Case Classification is a program under which cases are carefully analyzed to determine what their problems are and how serious. As a result of this analysis each case is classified as needing "intensive services", "environmental services" or "regular services"; cases with severe and complex problems, such as emotional troubles, are assigned to caseworkers who have responsibility for only 35 families and can give more time to these special needs; families who need help in situations related to their environment, such as jobs, housing and obtaining medical care, are assigned to caseworkers who serve 60 families and have time to give individual attention to each of them; persons who are largely self-sufficient and whose only need is for financial help, are assigned to caseworkers with much larger caseloads whose major responsibility is to make sure that assistance is provided in accord with agency standards and policies. Through Case Classification, many families have been rehabilitated, with an estimated saving to taxpayers of a million dollars a year.

My daughter is pregnant and unmarried. Can she get help until she is able to support the child herself?
The law requires you, as a parent, to help her as far as you are financially able. If you are not able to support her, Aid to Dependent Children or any of several private agencies can provide for her needs until after the baby is born. However, she will be expected to cooperate with law enforcement agencies in obtaining support from the father of the child if she requires assistance after the child is born.

Shouldn't fathers be forced to support their own children instead of relying on taxpayers?
Whenever a child requires assistance because of a non-supporting parent, law enforcement agencies are notified immediately. Public welfare cooperates with those agencies in obtaining support from parents wherever possible, even where the parents have moved to other states. However, when the father cannot be found or has no income, public welfare can meet the needs of the child until such a time as his own parents are available to support him.

Do I have to take a "Pauper's Oath" to get old age assistance?
Public welfare does not require a "pauper's oath". Old Age Assistance recipients may retain the home they live in along with up to \$250 in cash or liquid assets and any other personal property so long as the total value of all personal property does not exceed a thousand dollars. Household furniture, jewelry and the home itself are not included in this total. It is necessary that you provide the welfare department with full information about what resources you have when you make your application for assistance.
