

Soil fumigation consists of injecting a chemical, usually in the liquid form ,into the soil. This chemical, after reaching a certain temperature, volatilizes or changes into a gas. The gas spreads through spaces between soil particles destroying insects and discesses harmful to many different berries, says Zinn.
