Decoration Rules Given

Christmas decorations are beginning to appear and activity is noted among those who plan contest entries in the 1964 chamber of commerce competition. An entry blank for registering entries is printed herewith and all persons interested are advised to clip and save it to use when they are ready. Deadline is 5 p.m. December 18.

Several businesses have some decorations in place and indicate they plan more. Candlelight and ornaments all help promote the Christmas spirit for those who enter places of business which are taking on the festive air. Those merchants who wish to enter the commercial competition will find a place to check on the entry blank and the time for making entries is the same as for home displays.

To avoid confusion, the rules are recapitulated here briefly:

Winners will be selected on the basis of artistic merit, originality, lighting techniques and ingenuity, Judging will be limited to outsde residential displays only.

Boundaries for contest will extend from Pittsburg on north to Timber route junction with Sunset highway on south.

No display will be considered eligible for prizes unless it is registered. There will be no charge for registration. Purpose of registering is to insure that all those wishing to be judged by categories will receive a

For Mailing

The head of the Vernonia post office also reminds his patrons that the use of free "local" and "out-oftown" separation bands will help move the mails faster. The bands are available at the post office or from most letter carriers.

December 5 is the suggested deadline for mailing out-of-town packages. "Don't worry about the parcels being delivered too early, just mark 'Don't Open Until Christmas' on the front," Bateman said.

A tightly stuffed package, with nothing rattling around inside, will have less chance of being damaged in transit, he noted.

"When packing a gift, remember that the package you send may be shipped on the bottom of a mail sack and there may be heavier packages on top. Among the relatively few packages that are damaged in transit, improper packaging is the greatest factor," the postmaster said.

Just to be on the safe side, the postmaster suggests that all packages be insured.

He noted that poor packaging and addresses which are either incorrect or not legible are responsible for the non-delivery of about half a million parcels each year. If the return address is incorrect or illegible and the package cannot be returned, it will be saved for 90 days. If unclaimed, the parcel is usually lost to the sender or intended recipient. Such parcels wind up in public auctions held at 15 major post offices across the nation.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should also have the address written on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off.

Bateman emphasized that Zip Coding the addresses on parcels and letters helps insure against loss due to improper addressing. Since each area of the country has an individto this area for their performance ual ZIP Code, there is little chance two years ago of a musical program of a piece of mail destined for one being directed to a city which may have a similar name. For example, there are at least 26 possible areas around the country which would have Springfield in the address. Use of the proper ZIP Code would send the mail to the right post office.

"We are asking everyone to be especially cooperative this holiday season. During the peak of the 'rush' we expect that seven billion pieces will be delivered during the entire month of December. That's quite a bit of mail," the postmaster conclud-

Savings Bond Sales Totaled

"U. S. Savings Bonds sales in Columbia county amounted to \$53,747.00 for the month of October."

Volunteer Phil Hickey, Savings Bonds chairman, made the above announcement recently in his monthly sales report.

"Total sales for the state during the month are \$2,999,954, up from the year ago total of \$2,918,712", he continued.

'Nationally, cash sales of Series E and H Bonds amounted to \$365 million for October, while the total value of Savings Bonds held by Americans topped the \$48 billion mark for an all-time high."

He predicted that "sales during the last two months of this year will reflect the growing American custom of giving Savings Bonds as Christmas gifts. Many people are building a family tradition of giving bonds during Christmas and birthdays to help finance college educations or for other funds designed to help families towards a brighter future."

Oregon anglers are reminded by the game commission that the angling regulations set by the commissioners on November 16 are for 1965. Apparently some persons have tried applying the new rules too soon and have come to grief with the game law enforcement officers of the Oregon State Police.

Some of the new rules include the three salmon bag limit in tidal waters and the opening of several lakes to year-around angling. Synopses of these new rules should be available at all license agencies before the effective date of January 1 according to the commission.
