# AROUND THE FARM

Electronic record keeping services production. are now becoming available to farmers as a means of providing accurate and readily available information about the farm business. Most of the time adequate cost data is not available in time for the operator to make constructive decisions about management, but the electronic processing of records can improve this situation

considerably. Currently a pilot program is underway at Washington State University wherein the Western Electronic Farm Accounting Project is engaged in providing computer service to a limited number of farm operators.

Now the University of Arizona is offering electronic processing of records for farmers on a direct fee basis. The Arizona system requires that the farmer code his own entries. This means a little more work for the farmer, but once the code is learned it may be more efficient than standard procedures.

Farmers participating in 1965 will pay 14 cents per entry. The total money cost may be estimated by the participant by multiplying the average number of checks written per month by 1.3 and then multiplying this times 14 cents.

The Arizona program provides a running summary of costs and revenue by enterprise and a year-end summary statement including net worth. There is no enterprise or farm business analysis.

Farmers interested in participating in such a program should make arrangements right away so that their records will start with the first of the year.

Most farmers know something about the soil on their farms. They know the depth of the soil, whether it's light, sandy and porous or heavy, tight, and sticky. From experience gained over a period of years they know which crops do best on certain fields and which spots fail to produce satisfactorily. They frequently do not, however, know about all the other factors which affect maximum crop

Among the many factors that need to be considered are the amount of organic matter, the amount of available plant food nutrients present in the soils such as phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium, and numerous minor elements. These factors are highly variable from place to place and between soil types.

Much of this knowledge know-how, or experience has been gained by a trial and error method. This is good, but this method of crop production and soil treatment can be more expensive than need be--and frequently the results are slow or uncertain.

One of the best ways to gain a better knowledge of your soil and its needs is to have the soil tested. Naturally, the results of a soil test are no better than the sample. It is important that samples be representative of the particular field involved, and if dried, that artificial heat not be used in doing so.

Other particulars of taking soil samples may vary with the situation. but full details, including the necessary cartons and information cards, can be secured from county Extension offices.

Signing of the Food Stamp Act by the President in August has some farreaching implications for many people whether they are producers of agricultural commodities, recipients of the food stamps, or the general public. This makes permanent a pilot program under trial in urban and rural areas of 22 states and provides for gradual expansion in the next three years to the counties and communities requesting it.

The food stamp program provides individual food subsidies to needy families according to degree of need, with all the foods purchased at regular retail stores. Under the provisions of the act, all food or food products for human consumption may be purchased with federal food coupons except alcholic beverages, tobacco, foods which are identified on the package as imported, and meat and meat products which are im-

Thus rather than moving a limited and specific group of "surplus" foods, the modern food stamp plan is intended to generally increase the consumption of a range of commodities. Research made during the trial indicates that food coupon users largely selected the items that not In loving memory of Sister Clara only provided better nutrition but also require a maximum of America's farm resources to produce.

For agricultural marketers, the fact that the food stamp recipients purchase foods of their choice at regular retail outlets is a key element of the program. And while the expense of this program will be charged to the U.S. department of agriculture, certainly such costs are for total public benefit rather than the reduction of agricultural abundances.
