New Blue Book Now on Sale

The 1965-66 edition of the State of Oregon's most useful and popular reference work—the Oregon Blue Book—went on sale to the public this week, according to Secretary of State Tom McCall.

The price remains at \$1, McCall said, and copies may be purchased by mail or personal application at the secretary of state's offices at the capitol in Salem or state office building at 1400 S.W. 5th avenue, Portland. The \$1 covers postage. This price is for the hard-bound volume. The book sells for \$1,50 with spiral binding—a form much in demand by writers and students.

"In no other volume is it possible to find in streamlined form such a wealth of information on Oregon's government, constitution, economy, traditions and history," McCall said.

He was high in his praise of the two editors of the book, Pete Sukalac and Wanda Merrill, both state employees, who prepared the layouts and contents under the general supervision of McCall's predecessor as secretary of state, Howell Appling Jr.

The presses printing the Blue Book were stopped to enable the printers, Agency Lithograph of Portland, to replace six pages of facts of Oregon with newspaper pictures of Oregon's Christmas flood. Other last-minute inclusions, which make the book the most current ever published, report the appointment of three judges whose terms of office will not begin until early in 1965.

New features in this 1965-66 edition highlight Dr. John McLoughlin; "How the Democratic and Republican Parties Began"; a resume of progress on automated voting in Oregon, and the proper display of the U. S. flag.

Mexico to Canada Trailride Movie Scheduled for Showing

Don and June Mulford will show their "Mexico to Canada Trailride" movie in Vernonia at the Joy Theater, Sunday, February 7, in St. Helens at the Columbia Theater, Monday, February 8 and in Clatskanie in the Avalon Theater, Tuesday, February 16. Doors open at 7, show starts at 8, and is over at 10 p.m. Admission for adults is \$1.00, children under 12, 50c and pre-schoolers are admitted free.

The Mulfords sold their herd of registered cattle, leased their ranch, which is at Rt. 1, Castle Rock, Washington, trucked their horses south to the Mexican border. There they sold their truck and started back north the hard way, on horseback. In California, they rode on the California Riding and Hiking trail and the John Muir trail, crossed Oregon on the Skyline trail, and crossed Washington on the Cascade Crest trail.

Mulford said one of the "tough spots" was on Mt. Whitney Pass in Southern California at an elevation of 13,777 feet in early June. They had to dig their trail through the snow to reach the top of the pass. Impassable snow banks blocked an east slope descent. Then they rode to the top of Army Pass and again the east slope stopped them. Next day they made it over Cottonseed Pass to Lone Pine. By this time they had been out of grain for the horses for three days and down to hotcakes and coffee three times a day for themselves.

June thought that the "tough spot for her" was when she had to lead her two horses across a swinging bridge, high above the middle fork of the Feather River canyon.

Riding the same two horses they had trucked to Mexico and leading a pack horse, and a mule named "Handy Andy", they covered 2485 miles of wilderness trail in five months and ten days and finished the ride still able to smile.

Don said, "We're alike, June and I. All our lives we've wanted to see what's over the next hill, to trail into the high country with never a bit of backtracking. If we lost the trail, we never back-tracked; just kept going until we hit the trail again. It's fun that way".

"We finished the ride September 28, one day later and the last pass near the Canadian border was blocked. We could have been snowed in on the north side, and would have had to wait for the snow to melt before we would have been able to find the trail out."

When the ride was completed, the Mulfords, after seeing the horses were well cared for, edited their film and headed for Hollywood. There they leased TV rights on the movie to "The High Road to Danger." They have also appeared on uary 28.

"Art Linkletter's House Party", Ben Alexander's "About Faces" and Jack Linkletter's "On the Go", all on national TV, and have appeared on about 50 local TV programs. They rode saddle horses down Hollywood and Vine, in Hollywood, California, for the Jack Linkletter show.

This movie will be shown in magnificent color at the Joy Theater in Vernonia, Sunday, February 7, at the Columbia Theater in St. Helens, Monday, February 8 and in the Avalon Theater in Clatskanie, Tuesday, February 16. Don and June will be there in person. Plan to attend.
