Dr. Thiringer At Symposium

Dr. Sheridan A. Thiringer was among the 500 physicians from the Pacific Northwest who attended the Oregon Academy of General Practice symposium on cortico-steroids held in Portland January 29.

The symposium was held to provide physicians of the region with latest data on the various uses of cortico-steroids, a relatively new family of synthetic drugs of 12 different types, with a broad scope of medical applications ranging from allergic emergencies to the treatment of rheumatism.

In addition to the six medical authorities who presented papers on cortico-steroids, Dr. Morris J. Fishbein, internationally honored and widely known physician, was featured as the luncheon speaker.

The medical symposium was part of the Oregon Academy of General Practice program of postgraduate education for physicians in general practice and was presented under a grant from Lederle Laboratories. The Academy of General Practices is the only medical organization which requires its members to earn credits at the postgraduate level. Its physicians must obtain at least 150 hours of accredited study in a three-year period to maintain membership. The symposium on cortico-steroids carried five and one-half accredited hours.

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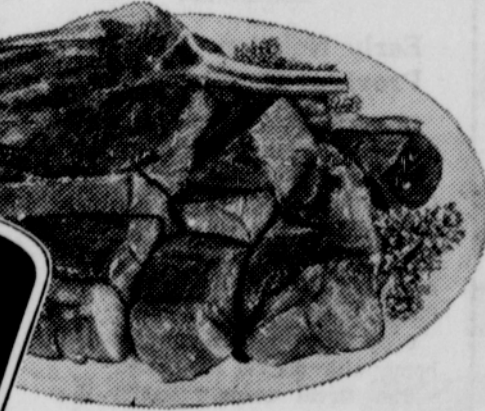
