Opinions Heard On Court House

An overflow crowd packed the county court room in the court house at St. Helens last Wednesday evening for the hearing on the court house question. The legal notice calling the meeting asked consideration on building a new court house on the St. Helens flat iron site and transfer of the court house annex fund and O&C revenues to that purpose.

At the meeting, the architects, Schmeer and Harrington, evaluated four sites, the flat iron site, the present court house site and adjacent area, the Violette property on highway 30, and the Neuman addition tract. The tabulation of costs for these sites is given on this page.

The architects favored the building of a new courthouse on the flat iron site and gave the following reasons: central location, adequate width of surounding streets, location in business area, and space for parking area.

The Violette area on the highway, according to the evaluation, is on the edge of town, remote from business area but is accessible from the highway. Persons from other parts of the county have voiced opinions that a location on the highway would place a courthouse in a better position to serve all areas and that since it is a county courthouse that deserves more consideration than the nearness of St. Helens businesses. The architects opposed the Neu-

man tract because it is in a primarily residential area and the streets are too narrow.

The present site, if used for a new courthouse would require destruction of the present courthouse which many wish to retain, even if a new courthouse is built, for use as a museum.

Circuit judges, J. S. Bohannon and Avery Combs, were at the meeting and described the present circuit court facilities as "the worst in the state." Bohannon cited the bad acoustics, poor heating and toilet facilities, lack of law library space, and industrial noise distraction. He favors a new courthouse.

There were a number of petitions presented at the meeting which were not read or discussed there, but are now being checked by the county clerk for validity of signatures.

Friday, following the hearing, a ruling by the Oregon state attorney general, Robert Y. Thornton, was

made known in which he declared that the annex fund had reverted to the general fund last June. The sinking fund had been set up for a definite period and, according to his decision, if not used in that time the reversion was automatic

Tuesday of this week, Judge Earl Seawright and Columbia County District Attorney Don Kalberer were in Salem to confer with Thornton. They determined that the court could go ahead with calling an election on questions presented on the petitions and an announcement is expected by next week as to when an election will be held and what the questions are to be submitted.

A rebudgeting of funds would be required to allocate the former annex fund for use now.

Against Warrenton, the Loggers started off fast in the first quarter and with Dan Steele scoring eight points, mostly on fast break layins, the Vernonia team rushed to a nine point first period advantage, 18-9.

The Warrior's from Warrenton came back strong in the second period, using a full court press with good results, and were able to outscore the Loggers 25-13 and went down at halftime leading 34-31.

The second half was played on even terms with neither team able to gain much of a lead. The Loggers were able to tie it up in the final seconds of the game when Steele was fouled while scoring on a layin and then sank the freethrow. Score at the end of the regulation time was 60-60.

Permit Needed For Open Fires

Vernonia Fire Chief Don Webb has issued a request to all residents of the city to observe the city burning ordinances. All open fires within the city limits require a fire permit, regardless of size or time of year. The people who reside in the newly annexed areas will now be required to get city burning permits, whereas they previously came under the jurisdiction of the state laws and obtained permits from the Pittsburg guard station.

Webb also stated that permits should be obtained in person and not over the telephone, or by sending children after them. Persons applying should give information as to the size of fire and type of material to be burned. They also should have hoses and shovels at the fire scenes. Permits may be obtained by contacting Chief Webb, Assistant Chief Ray, or at Ralph's Chevron
