Winter Best to **Mark Wet Spots**

Winter is a good time to mark the wet spots in your fields and to make plans for draining them, according to Andy Pavelek of the Soil Conservation Service. These wet areas reduce crop yields, delay planting time and are hazardous when farm equipment gets stuck trying to cross them. The soil in wet areas is compact and more difficult to till.

The best time to install tile drainage is in the late spring, summer or fall when the ground is firm.

Cost share payments from the Columbia county ASC office pay about one-half of the cost of installing most tile drains. Technical assistance for surveying and laying out the tile systems is available through the Soil Conservation Service office.

QUESTION: What is the Neighborhood Youth Corps and where can I find out more about it?

ANSWER: The Neighborhood Youth Corps is established as a work-training program under Title 1-B of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is a part of the U.S. Department of Labor's Manpower Administration. The NYC will make it possible for youth 16 through 21 to stay in school. return to school if they have already left the classroom, obtain work experience and develop work skills if they are out of school and out of work. Young men and women employed in the Neighborhood Youth Corps will be assigned useful tasks which otherwise would not be performed in government agencies and non-profit organizations. Their work will result in better services and improved facilities for the public benefit.
