



the Columbia County Public Welfare Commission reports the following expenditures for the month ending December 31: General assistance, \$2,-6031.31; foster care, \$2,424.73; old age assistance, \$8178.45; aid to dependent children, \$11,755.53; aid to the blind. \$414.49; aid to the disabled, \$4,796.01; Kerr Mills program, \$7,085.61; total expenditures, \$37,258.13.

Of the above expenditures, \$11,-452.38 was from state funds; \$20,-897.60 from federal funds, and \$4,-908.15 from county funds,

Child welfare workers gave service to 98 children in the county, including 54 in foster homes and one in an adoptive home. There are 33 certified foster homes in use at this
