City Ordinances Read at Meeting Of Councilmen

A miscellany of more or less routine business occupied the attention of the Vernonia city council Monday

Three ordinances were given their first and second reading and then laid over for the final reading and passage at a later meeting. They were as follows: One for the annexation of the area at the northerly city limits east of the Nehalem river concerning which a hearing was called January 18; the increasing of water service connection fees to \$85 for five-eighths inch service, \$100 for three-quarter inch service and \$125 for one inch service and one for sale of the bank building to U.S. National Bank.

City Attorney Robert Vagt reported that he had prepared a resolution, agreement and ordinance whereby rules for use of drives and parking on school property could be set up and the city asume the responsibility for their enforcement. Action on this report hinges on agreement with school authorities.

Chet Ray, representing the fire department, entered a request for authorization of the purchase of a portable pump with two and a half inch outlet from funds included in the budget, and for purchase of a 24-foot extension ladder. The council approved purchase of a 24-foot wooden ladder but on the motion of Councilman C. E. Miller, seconded by H. C. Hertel, the request for the pump was turned down. However, Councilman L. E. Atkins then moved a re-examination of the pump request and he was appointed to attend to this and report his findings to the council.

Councilman Hertel reported that a representative from Paramount Pest Control would meet with the council March 1 to discuss methods of rat control. He had requested that the county health officer be asked to be

Further steps were taken toward determining means of removing hazardous buildings. Agreement on the part of property owners will eliminate one and owners of others are still being sought in order to secure permission for removal of buildings or action on their part to that end.

Other business included discussion of street right of ways, park shrub plantings, and miscellaneous items, and the granting of permission to Melvin Peddicord for removal of a tree between the curb and his property line.

County Court Sets Election For April 23

In action taken Monday of this week, the Columbia county court has set April 23 as the time for a vote by the people of the county on the

The decision to call for the vote followed the presentation of petitions from various parts of the county at the February 3 hearing which had been called by the court after they had decided on a new court house on the flat iron site and transfer of the annex fund and O&C land funds for that purpose

Since the hearing, it has been determined that the annex fund had automatically reverted to the general fund in July. The ballot will call for designation of that amount and the O&C land funds for a new court house and will call for a vote on four sites: The present court house site and adjacent land; the flat iron site, the tract on the highway known as the Violette tract and a fourth tract between the Columbia District hospital and the Neuman subdivision.

To select a site, one site must receive a majority of all votes cast. If no majority is received in the vote, one conjecture is that the court could then proceed with their original plan but the legal aspects have not been studied or a decision given.

The number of children who appeared in juvenile court hearings (based on above referrals as well as some December, 1964 referrals; included three dependencies. Of these, two were made wards of the court and one was made a ward of the court with care and custody to welfare. One parental control case also was referred to the court. This child was made a ward of the court and placed on probation.
