Ed Ryding, Mayger, became the first new cooperator for 1965 by signing an agreement with the district last week. Technical services now will be made available for planning and in alleviating a drainage problem on his farm.

The district now has 353 cooperators, farmers who have signed agreements, and are receiving technical assistance from the district.

The district furnished some 758 technical services to 107 cooperators during the year of 1964.

Those who plan to request assistance from the district should get requests in early to be put on the growing list of those wanting such assistance this year.
