# THE PUBLIC **WELFARE?**

\* Questions about public welfare which are of general interesc are answered in this column as a public service. Help with individual probfare office.)

when I go in to apply for old age asistance?

It would be very helpful if you would bring with you proof that you are sixty-five or over and that you have lived in Oregon for the last five years out of the last nine, including the year before you apply for assistance. The latter could be in the form of rent receipts or a written statement from some person who has known you during the time you have lived in Oregon. In addition, you should bring all bank books, deeds, insurance policies and other documents related to resources or property transactions.

If a person asks for a fair hearing regarding his right to assistance does he have to have a lawyer?

No. These hearings are conducted on an informal basis and give the recipient an opportunity to discuss his situation in his own words. However, he is entitled to bring with him any other person he wishes, including an attorney if he has one.

If a family gets abundant foods or food stamps can they still get a food allowance through welfare?

The purpose of food distribution programs is to provide low-income people, including public assistance recipients, with a better diet than would otherwise be available to them. These programs are intended to supplement their regular food budget, not to substitute for it. However, a welfare recipient in a county where food stamps are distributed must pay for the stamps with a portion of money included in his grant for food.

Can a person live anywhere he wants to if he gets welfare help?

Public welfare standards decide how much is allowed in a welfare grant for shelter. It is up to the recipient to choose a place to live that will be within his means just as it would be up to any other person with a fixed income.

If I contribute to my mother directly, will I still get a bill from welfare at the end of the year?

It will be necessary for public welfare to make a determination as to your liability, but you will receive credit for any contributions you have made which are reported to your county welfare department.

If caseworkers salaries here are below average, does that mean they hire just anyone without screening or taking an oath that they don't belong to the Communist Party?

No. A thorough screening of applicants is always done, although loyalty oaths are not a requirement. It necessary, a job will be left unfilled rather than hire a caseworker who appears to have less than the minimum qualifications.

Public welfare paid for my uncle's hospitalization but the hospital sent a bill to him too. Does he have to pay it out of his welfare grant?

No. No allowance is included in his grant for payment of medical bills, and assistance grants, by law, are exempt from garnishment, levy or execution. There is no legal way that your uncle can be forced to pay any bill out of his assistance grant.

What is the relationship between public welfare and the welfare recovery division?

Public welfare is administered by the State Public Welfare Commission as a means of providing for needy people who are too old to work, too disabled to work or children too young to work. The Welfare Recovery Division is a part of the Justice Department under the direction of the Attorney General of Oregon. Its function is to obtain enforcement of child support laws and to deal with certain types of fraud cases.


