Bank Deposits Show Increase

U. S. National Bank of Oregon has reported an increase in deposits of 7.3 per cent, according to figures released to James J. Saxon, comptroller of the currency, on the April 26 call date.

E. J. Kolar, U. S. National president, reported that deposits on that date totaled \$1,086,161,015.80, an increase of \$73,747,836.06 over the April 15, 1964 call date.

At the same time, loans and discounts moved upward by 7.1 per cent from \$597,508,728.61 a year ago to \$639,620,545.55. This was a jump of more than \$42 million.

The Vernonia Branch of the U. S. National recorded total deposits of \$1,715,808.79, according to B. R. Pilger, manager. Loans and discounts for the local branch stood at \$322,086.21.

Total resources for the 97-office statewide system also moved upward by \$90 million to a new call date high of \$1,207,096,910.42. Capital funds stood at \$90,373,149.94, compared to a figure of \$83,532,355.61 on the 1964 call date.
