State Heifer Sale Offered

Oregon's state dairy herd at the penitentiary annex will dispense 46 Holstein heifers at an auction, Saturday, May 15, reports Don Coin Walrod, county extension agent. The 12 noon sale is to be at the Cottage Farm Barns located five miles from Salem on the Aumsville highway.

Cliff Conrad, farm administrator and Ted Emick, herdsman, have selected heifers that will start freshening in August and continue through the winter. About 15 will be open.

The heifers come from a Dairy Herd Improvement association tested herd whose rolling production average March 1 on three time a day milking was 17,391 pounds of milk and 632 pounds of butterfat for 247 Holstein cows.

Veterans Make Memorial Poppy

Disabled war veterans working in hospitals and convalescent workrooms in many parts of the country are completing the millions of memorial poppies which will be worn in honor of the war dead on Poppy Day in May according to Mrs. Ralph Valpiani, poppy chairman for the Vernonia American Legion auxiliary.

More than 6,000 veterans of three wars have been given employment by the auxiliary in its poppy making work this year. Earnings of the veterans making poppies, who are the only paid workers in the poppy program, were estimated at \$300,000.

The local auxiliary will have a corps of volunteer workers distributing these memorial flowers on the downtown streets and at shopping centers all day on Poppy day, the exact date of which will be given later. These workers will carry coin boxes to receive contributions for the auxiliary's work with the disabled veterans and needy children of veterans.

It is hoped that everyone will wear a poppy to honor the war dead and will contribute to help these living victims of war.

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Four Weeds Classified Noxious by Department

Quackgrass, Horsetail rush, morning glory and Canada thistle are classified as noxious weeds and will be prohibited in nursery stock sold in Oregon after September 1, 1966, under an order issued last week by the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

The nursery advisory committee to the Oregon Department of Agriculture proposed that the department establish the noxious weed list and asked for a hearing on the matter. The hearing was April 15 in Salem and all attending approved the list.

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
