Missionary Due From Swaziland

Rev. Paul H. Hetrick, missionary to Swaziland, South Africa, will speak at the Vernonia church of the Nazarene Thursday evening at 7:00 p.m. Rev. and Mrs. Hetrick were first assigned to Africa in 1945, and now are on their third furlough home.

Since their first assignment, Mr. Hetrick has been missionary evangelist, Bible school principal, and is currently the supervisor of the church work in the Swazi-Zulu area, with his headquarters at Endingeni, Swaziland. He will show colored slides of the work in Africa.

Prior to assignment to Africa, Hetrick pastored churches in Wareham, Mass.; and in Providence, Rhode Island. While on furlough, the Hetricks make their home in Nashville, Tennessee.

Marine Tells of Viet Cong Fight

The following article was brought to the Eagle office by Mrs. Grace Currie who had the clipping from a Salem paper. Marine Youngquist is the grandson of Mrs. Currie's brother.

"BATANGAN PENINSULA Viet Nam (AP)—Marine Lt. Michael D. Youngquist of Salem, Ore., told how it was hunting the Viet Cong on the Batangan Peninsula.

"We were moving toward a heavy tree line when my lead man and I saw about five men hiding in a bush about six feet away," said Youngquist, a platoon commander in the 1st Battalion of the 7th Marines.

"I challenged them once in English and once in Vietnamese.

"They ran toward a pine grove. On command, my men opened up and cut down two of them. That started it. We began to receive fire immediately, but we couldn't tell from where.

"I sent a fire team up to search the bodies of the two men we had cut down. The men searched one of the bodies, then started toward the other one. The 'body' rolled over and lobbed a grenade. One of my men was hit in the arm, another in the leg. It's fortunate they weren't killed. They were both wearing flak jackets."

The fight lasted about 30 minutes Wednesday night.

It was the platoon's only contact with the enemy since Marines and South Vietnamese launched their assault Tuesday.

At daybreak Thursday, the Marines began their sweep back through the same area, searching, probing and blowing up caves.

Major G. H. Gentry Jr., intelligence officer for the 7th Marines, said a wounded Viet Cong captured in a cave was a medic. Before the prisoner died, Gentry said, he told intelligence officers he was called two weeks ago to work in a Viet Cong field hospital. He said he had helped treat more than 200 wounded Viet Cong, apparent casualties in the mid-August battle at nearby Van Tuong in which the Marines killed 600.

Gentry said the medic also related that he had been left behind to treat Viet Cong wounded when the main force pulled out three days before the Marines moved in.

Goodwill Sets Good Turn Date

Open House will be the Order of the Day at Goodwill Industries next Saturday, October 23, in the big plant on S. E. Grand avenue at Mill street. The handicapped Goodwill workers will be at their machines and benches all day to permit Boy Scouts and others to see Goodwill's rehabilitation program in action. The workers will have their rest day off earlier in the week. Open house hours are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The plant is thrown open each year about now especially so Boy Scouts, Cubs and Explorers who take part in the annual Good Turn for Goodwill clothing collection can see the people they help at their work. Adult Scout leaders are invited, too, and urged to attend with their boys. This year an entire day is given over to the open house, so that more Scouts and the general public, too, may be accommodated if they wish to see the Goodwill operation. Tours are not limited to October 23 but may be arranged any time by phoning the Goodwill's public relations office.

The Scouts Good Turn for Goodwill clothing drive will be on Saturday, November 20. Some 25,000 Scouts and Cubs are expected to take part in the 1965 drive.
