West Coast to Serve 6 Areas

State Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill has announced an agreement to allow West Coast Telephone Co., a subsidiary of General Telephone Co., New York to become the sole telephone utility in the six Oregon areas where the company serves without competition. He, however, turned down the firm's request that a large area in the vicinity of the proposed site of High Mountain Sheep Dam on the Snake river in Wallowa county be allocated to it for future development. Hill said the company did not convince him that it would be the one that could serve the area in the most economical and feasible manner.

Hill's action, made under the provisions of a 1961 Oregon law designed to eliminate unnecessary duplication of expensive facilities, prevents other companies from building lines into the West Coast service areas.

The areas allocated to West Coast were subject to lengthy hearings in May and June at Portland, Salem, Coquille and La Grande. The company has about 96,000 customers in its service areas.

A PUC spokesman said the PUC order allocated the following areas in the state to West Coast: Area A, includes portions of Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Yamhill, and Columbia counties and contains the exchanges of Vernonia, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Beaverton, Tigard, Scholls, Sherwood, and Newberg.

Area B includes other portions of Multnomah and Clackamas counties containing exchanges at Gresham and Sandy.

Area C covers a portion of Columbia county and consists of the Clatskanie exchange.

Area D covers part of Yamhill and Polk counties and includes the

exchanges at McMinnville and Amity.

Area E takes in portions of Union and Wallowa counties and contains exchanges at Elgin, Imbler, La Grande, Cove, Union, Wallowa, Lostine, Enterprise and Joseph - Innaha.

Winter Pruning Aid to Plants

Rose growers can give a little extra protection to their choice plants by cutting back some of the taller growing varieties at this time, suggests Don Coin Walrod, county extension agent.

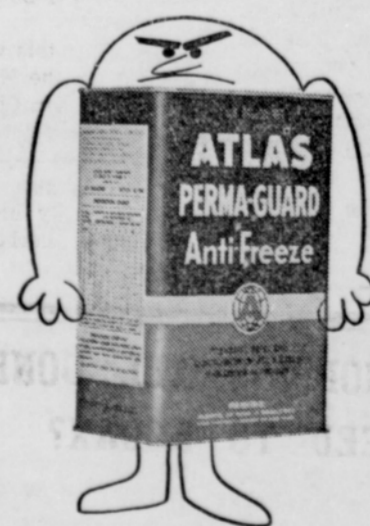
The cutting back done at this time should not constitute anything like the normal pruning practice, points out Walrod, but prevents loosening of the roots by the plants by wind whipping. Because of the manner in which the rose plants are developed on the understock, they are prone to being damaged by wind whipping.
