Red Cross TV Course Offered

Columbia county residents within the viewing range of KOAP/ TV, channel 10, Portland, will soon have an opportunity to get Red Cross first aid training in the comfort of their living rooms.

Guy Thomas of Vernonia and Rod Norwood of St. Helens, both members of the board of directors of the Oregon Trail chapter of Red Cross, jointly announced that channel 10 will broadcast the training films in ten half-hour sessions on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 p.m. beginning January 4.

The two Red Cross board members from Columbia county pointed out that viewers will, as a bonus, have an opportunity to complete the course and earn a Red Cross first aid certificate by preregistration, use of textbooks, and attendance of two work sessions to practice skills and evaluate abili-

Thomas and Norwood have made arrangements with the safety services department of the Oregon Trail chapter so that two work sessions necessary for viewers completion of the course will be held in St. Helens dependent on the volume of pre-registration. The place, dates, and times of the work sessions will be announced later to registrants.


Unit Packs Box For Christmas
