approved for this survey in the fiscal, 1966 appropriation bill, and the corps of engineers indicate that the completion of the survey from fiscal 1967 will require an additional \$91,-000. Senator Morse further states that he will give enthusiastic support to the maximum funds usable for the Tillamook Bay streams and the Nehalem river

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
