YOUR JOB

QUESTION: How does the non-farm and salary employment index look for the first part of 1966?

ANSWER: It looks very favorable for a fine employment economy in 1966. The index reached a record high in November of 128.4 compared to 120.5 for the same month in 1964 and usually the index reaches its peak in February. Actually, the employment economy never looked better and barring natural catastrophes and unfavorable weather conditions, 1966 should see more employment records broken.

QUESTION: Of the claimants who draw unemployment insurance, how many draw the maximum amount of their benefits?

ANSWER: During the 1965 fiscal year, out of every 1,000 claimants filing for unemployment insurance in Oregon, 199 had insufficient earnings to draw any benefits; 152 had a valid claim but drew no checks; 543 drew only part of their benefits and 106 drew their maximum annual allowance. This means that only 16.3 percent of all persons drawing one or more weeks actually drew their maximum benefits in fiscal 1965.
