Agent Outlines Cleaning Aids

The individual has responsibilities too, when sending apparel or household textiles to the drycleaner, says Columbia County Extension Agent Mrs. Margaret Allyn. Because many fabrics are blends, it is necessary for the drycleaner to know fiber content in order to satisfactorily press the garment. Fabrics of 100 percent man-made, heat-sensitive fibers and blends of natural fiber with man-mades will become crinkly, shiny, glazed or scorched when pressed with too hot an iron.

Stains from such things as cold wave solutions and sugar, are hard to clean. The chemicals in the cold wave solution, once in a fabric, are not visible. Different dyes react differently. Sometimes the color change takes place after pressing while at other times it may not appear for weeks or months after dry cleaning. Sometimes a stain rather than a color change develops. The solution is to keep cold wave solution from getting on clothing.

Sugar stains may not be visible on the fabric either, but when subjected to heat or slow aging they appear as permanent brown stains. Usually they cannot be removed from silk or woolen fabrics, although they will sometimes come out of other fabrics. The drycleaner should be advised when the staining substances (juice, ginger ale, soft drinks, cocktails) have been spilled on clothing so he can treat it before drycleaning, says Mrs. Allyn.

Mrs. Paul Thompson of Clatskanie called on the Wayne Kysers Sunday afternoon.

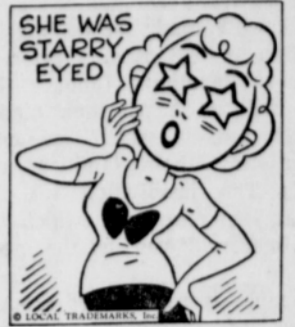
Mrs. Wayne Kyser was in Vernonia Thursday at the West Oregon building to attend the lesson

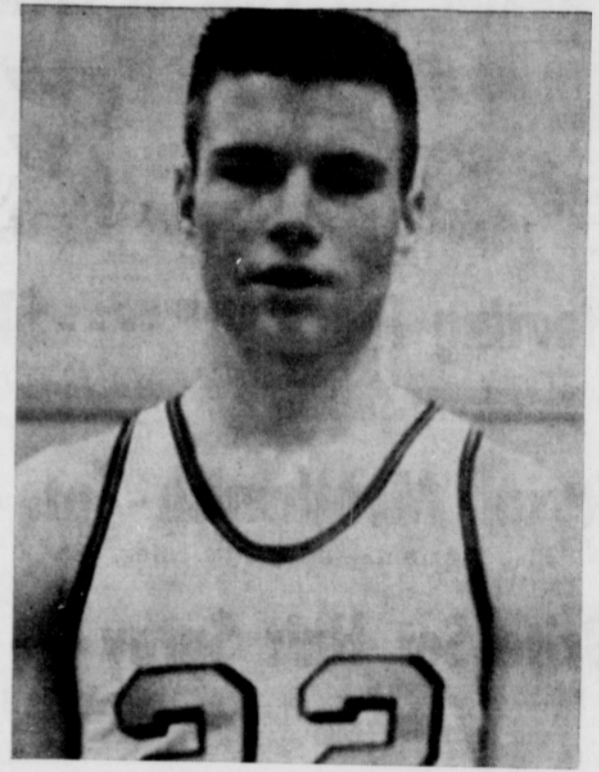

\$1.00 PENALTY in effect after March 1, 1966



In accordance to Chapter 609 ORS, all dogs which have a set of permanent canine teeth (approximately 5 months old) must wear a collar with license tag at all times. This provision of the law will be enforced.

There will be a complete check of the county area for unlicensed dogs.
