of 1967 fiscal year funds.

The program involves four pro-

al section of the Cascade Lakes highway which extends the work southerly of the Crane Prairie Reservoir area. This section is not on the state highway system but is of vital concern to the forest service and to the central Oregon counties. It will extend four miles and cost about \$450,000. It has been highway policy to keep a continuing project on this route insofar as funds will permit. A second project will extend the

modernization of the Lake of the Woods highway easterly of the lake to the foot of the hill. The contrast between the newly completed section and this old section is so great that some accidents have occurred. Klamath county has also asked that the project be approved. It will cover 3.7 miles and cost approximately \$1,200,000. The third project will modernize

the Mt. Hood Loop highway from Warm Springs junction easterly to the White River area. The existing road is extremely narrow, contains tortuous alignment and is in need of improvement. It is five miles long and will cost approximately \$1,200,000. The fourth project, on the Pen-

dleton-John Day highway, contemplates an asphaltic concrete wearing surface on a job that was completed by the Bureau of Public Roads last year. The present job contains only a light oil surface, which will not stand up under existing traffic for more than a short time. It extends 3.85 miles and will cost approximately \$200,000.

Aliens to File By January 31

District Director Alfred J. Urbano of the Immigration and Naturalization Service reminded aliens in Oregon that Monday, January 31, is the deadline for filing address report forms as required under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality

The Immigration official urged aliens who have not yet filed their address reports to do so no later than January 31 to avoid possible penalties.

Failure to comply with the requirements can mean a fine, jail sentence and deportation for a willful violation.

Urbano said the law requires that every alien except those having diplomatic status, representatives of certain international organizations and persons admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers must file the address report during January of each year at the nearest post office or immigration and naturalization service office.

Urbano said an estimated 15,000 aliens in this state have filed address reports so far this January. A total of 21,440 aliens filed address reports in Oregon last year. Reports for 1966 are expected to total 23,000.

Scenic Projects Given Approval

The Oregon State Highway Commission has approved a program of acquisition and development involving 26 highway beautification and scenic development projects on the federal-aid highway system in Oregon.

Under the program, 18 acquisition projects will cost approximately \$662,800 and the eight development projects will cost about \$314,-700. The funds, under the provisions of the Federal Highway Beautification Act, will be made available during the 1966 fiscal year. Approximately \$996,092 is avail-

able to the state for highway beautification. The state program which includes acquisition, development and preliminary engineering costs, is expected to total \$977,500. Projects and estimated costs listed in this area include:

Wilson River Highway: Located at Timber Junction, about three miles west of Glenwood, acquisition of woods and creek area, estimated at \$5,600.

Sunset Highway: Located at Sunset Tunnel, about nine miles east of Elsie, acquisition of a wooded hill protecting the tunnel, \$3,600; Barnes Road-Cornelius Pass Road, about three miles west of Portland's west city limits, a 5.81-mile roadside improvement project, approximately \$44,600. Oregon Coast Highway: Astoria
