Wednesday of this week the Rainbow Girls were guests of Nehalem Chapter, Order of Eastern Star.



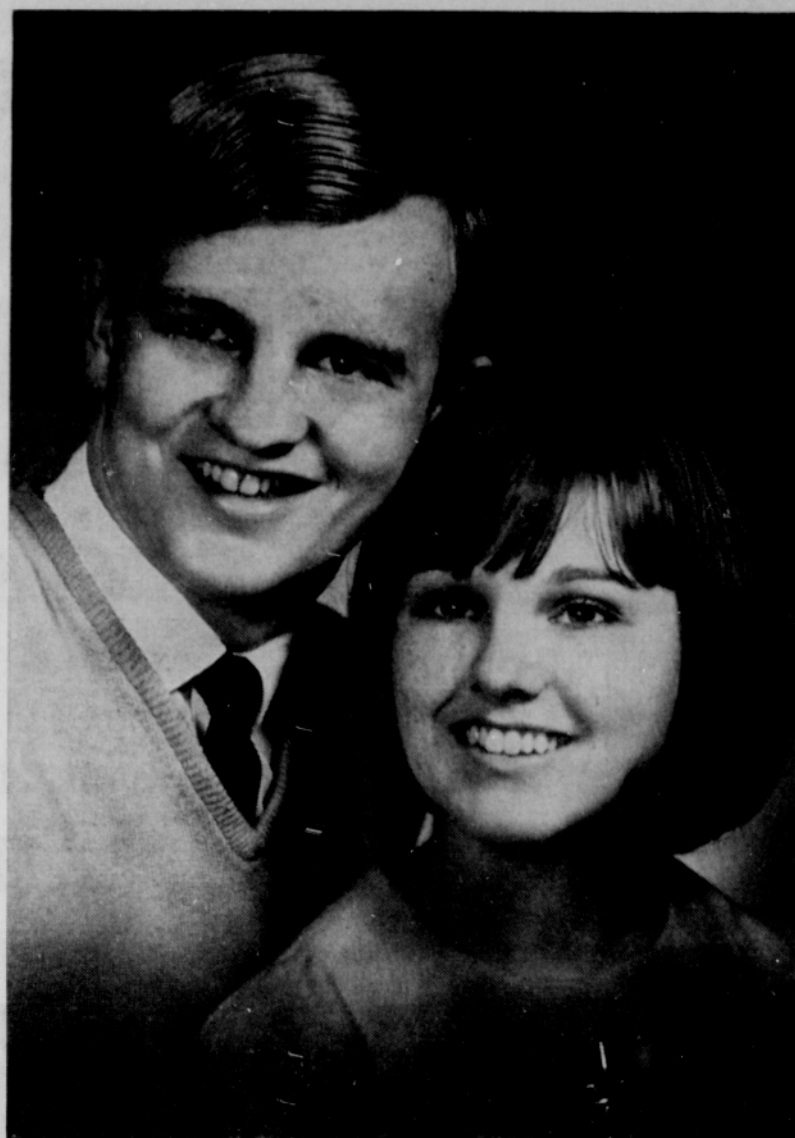
Babes Dominate News For Week
