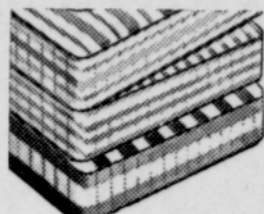

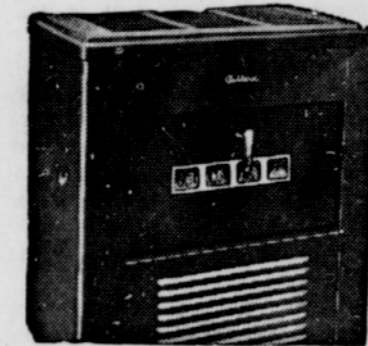

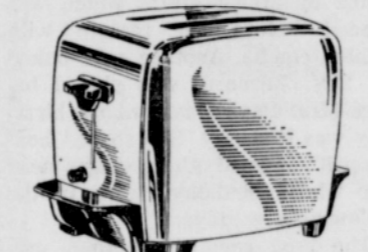

## Mother in Hospital Visited by Ladies

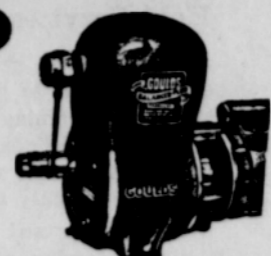
