

C-Z Road Lighting Improved To Give Public Added Safety

A program to further increase public safety at intersections of Crown - Zellerbach's Columbia Forest Road with public highways has been undertaken by the company.

Already installed is a larger red light where the Forest Road crosses the Columbia River Highway (U.S. 30) at Scappoose. Eight-inch diameter red lights facing motorists on the public highway have been replaced with 12-inch diameter surfaces.

In addition, the company has increased to two the number of flashing amber lights on signs warning motorists they are approaching the intersection. Additional lights will also illuminate the warning signs at night.

The Forest Road, completed by CZ in 1964 to relieve log truck travel on public roads, runs from the headquarters of the company's E. P. Stamm Tree Farm at Pittsburg, to its log boom at Scappoose.

This spring the company will install traffic lights at the two crossings of the Forest Road with the Scappoose-Vernonia highway. One of these is at Spitzenberg and the second just east of the Pittsburg junction.

Both of these lights will have 12-inch diameter red lights facing traffic on the public road.

Lights at all three of the intersections will be green to motorists on the public road except when a vehicle approaches on the Forest

When tree farm vehicles pass activators in the private road approximately 300 feet from each intersection, the light facing the public road will become amber for six

seconds before turning to red. "Motorists should be careful to remember this fact," R. M. King, manager of the Stamm Tree Farm, said. "When those lights begin to change it means a vehicle is about to enter the intersection. Most of them will be logging trucks, some towing two trailers and others with loads of poles up to 120 feet long. "For their own safety, drivers

should be sure always to obey the signals." The tree farm manager also issued a reminder that travel on

the Forest Road is open only to authorized vehicles.

History Group Dates Meeting

Columbia County Historical Society will meet Wednesday, March 23, in the first building from the entrance gate to the Columbia county fair grounds. There will be a potluck at noon followed by the regular session. All are welcome.

An invitation to Columbia county residents issued by the Aurora Colony Historical Society invites them to an "Old Style Sausage Dinner" on Sunday, March 20 from 12 noon to 5 p.m. in the Maplewood Grange hall, a half mile north of Aurora on Highway 99E. Old Colony dishes will be featured - sausage made from the colony recipe will be available for purchase.

It is planned to restore the old Ox Barn of the Colony as a museum, and furnishing it as it would have been in the days of the colony, dated 1856. Dr. Wm. Keil was the leader of this colony which came west from Pennsylvania, first to Missouri, then to Washington and finally to Aurora, Oregon. They traveled by ox-team and brought their customs with them. The Colony prospered until the death of

Dr. Keil in 1877. Mrs. Albert H. Powers is instrumental in this restoration in tribute to Dr. Burt Brown Barker on the occasion of his 90th birthday.

Forest Products Center Planned

A \$11/2 million center for the exhibition of forest products from Idaho, Oregon, Washington and California will be built in Portland, hopefully within 12 months.

Architect John Storrs has been given the go-ahead on plans and a preliminary sketch of the exterior has already been submitted.

Directors of Western Forestry Center, Inc., a non-profit corporation, have selected a three-acre site in Portland's tree-studded west hills near the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry and the Zoological Gardens.

The three-acre site belongs to the City of Portland and would eliminate three holes of the Hoyt park pitch and putt golf course, a municipally - owned operation. If the city fathers approve the site, the three holes would be relocated on

adjacent property. Western Forestry Center, Inc., listing prominent industry representatives from the four states on its board of directors, was formed after fire destroyed the old Forestry building, known as the largest log cabin in the world, in August 1964. The old structure was built during the Lewis and Clark world's fair in Portland in the

early 1900's. Charles W. Fox of Portland. president of Cascades Plywood for many years, is president of the non-profit corporation, which will seek funds for the new center in

a four-state campaign. The building will be constructed of modern forest products including lumber, plywood, hardboard,

laminated timbers etc. Approximately 45,000 feet of exhibit space will be available, plus a 300 - seat auditorium and an area for changing exhibits. A small admission charge will make it possible for the center to be selfsupporting.

OMSI Auction Items Wanted

Henry Anderegg, chairman for local participation in the Columbia county OMSI fund raising auction to be held March 26 at the fair grounds at Deer Island, stated early this week that letters are being sent this week to all businesses in this area asking for donations of items to be sold. He plans to pick items up here prior to March 24 and take them to the fair

grounds March 25. All money derived from the auction will go to the construction of an agricultural wing for OMSI. Similar fund raising auctions are being held in other counties throughout the state, also.

Anderegg stated that all donations to the auction are tax deductible. He has special blanks which will be filled out and given to each contributor to use for tax purposes. Persons who wish to give cash instead of merchandise are asked to make checks payable to OMSI.

While letters are being sent only to businesses, contributions from individuals are desired, also. They can be new or used items. Antique articles have good sales value. Items of small value or large value are all welcome. Those with items to be picked up may call Anderegg. or other members of the local committee, Wm. Rundle or Cecil Huff.
