## Lenten Meditation

Christ's empty tomb is the shining gateway to Heaven!

'Now upon the first day of the week, very early in the morning, they came unto the sepulchre, bringing spices which they had prepared. And they found the stone rolled away from the sepulchre. And they entered in, and found not the body of the Lord Jesus. Behold, two men stood by them in shining garments and said unto them, Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen.

The proof of the finished work of Jesus is His resurrection. It is the very climax of the Gospel. According to Paul the "Good news" is that Christ died and was buried and raised again from the dead to

The substitutionary sacrifice of Christ is only a part of this. The capstone of the Gospel is that Jesus not only died, but that He arose from the dead. The symbol of Christianity is not the cross, or, still less, a crucifix with a dead Christ upon it! A far more fitting symbol of our Christian faith would be an empty tomb!

For this reason every Gospel sermon ever preached by the apostles Peter, Paul, or any other - included and emphasized THE RESUR-RECTION. It is the resurrection which is the proof of the efficacy of the death of Christ, for had one sin remained unatoned, He could not have risen. His resurrection is the proof that EVERY SIN was atoned for on the cross. Remember, "The wages of sin is death". But He arose and proved that He HAD FINISHED the work, and that God was reconciled.

When Jesus died on the cross for our sins--He died for all of them. When we are saved by believing on Him, all our sins are forgiven-past, present, and future--for all our sins were future when Christ made atonement for them. This fact should impel us to live a life of holiness and separation unto


