In action during 1965, the Oregon state legislature passed laws to bring school election procedures into line with those for other elections and delegated to the county clerk the responsibility of administering school district elections.

The state also has adopted for distribution a manual outlining in detail the proper procedures. This manual is a reproduction of one prepared by Columbia County School Superintendent Ray K.
