We would have been glad to have given Mr. Sheeley a copy of the letter the Chamber wrote to Rep. Wyatt since he didn't realize from the item in the Eagle we were only concerned with the passage of the bill relating to a minimum wage for farm workers if it necessitated berry and bean growers to forego the hiring of teenagers during the harvesting of their crops.

The Chamber is not adverse to any minimum wage law for adults. Common sense tells us that very few teenagers would be hired at a minimum wage for adults. This would deprive many young people of the opportunity of earning money for school clothes and supplies.

Rep. Wyatt's reply to the Chamber stated: "I am thoroughly familiar with this matter and I fully support your position." And in a copy of a letter to the Newberg Graphic, Wyatt states: "These farm industries have provided substantial income to school children who have been able to take care of their clothing, incidentals and school needs from this source of income. Jobs are becoming much scarcer for young people and I believe we must do what we can to help them."

Laurence Johnston's house has undergone a new paint job. Francis Larson did the work.

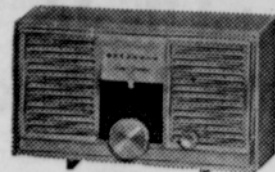

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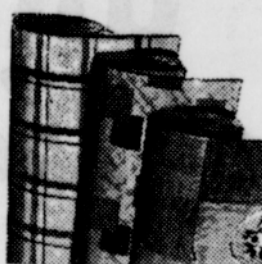


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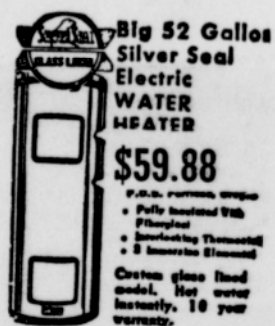
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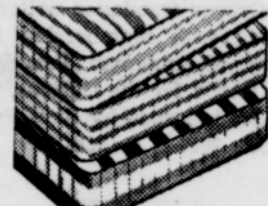
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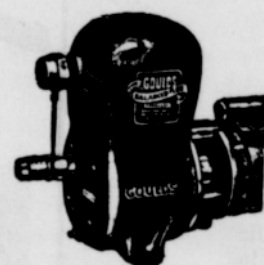


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## Child Shut In Home Freezer
