Study, Orderly Planning Required for Zoning Code

(Part 3 of a three part series)

Many Oregonians, native or otherwise, would like to build a fence at the borders to turn back the people who are migrating to Oregon from the other 49 states, and bringing with them the many problems that always accompany growth and development.

This isn't a very practical solution, though. As an alternative, Oregonians in many areas of the state are sitting down together now to make plans that will insure orderly development and growth of their areas, says Don Coin Walrod, county extension agent.

One of the most useful tools for the planners is zoning to guide land use. A good zoning ordinance can help a community develop to its fullest potential while preserving the qualities that make the community a desirable place for people to live; qualities such as pure air, clean water, pleasant surroundings and areas that provide opportunities for outdoor recreation. Zoning can also help prevent urban blight, a disease that attacks communities where haphazard, unregulated land use spreads sprawling subdivisions, shopping centers and garbage dumps over the countryside. Urban sprawl can block constructive development and increase the tax burden while driving out farming and keeping other tax-producing industry away.

How does a county or community get a good zoning ordinance written and passed? In Union county, to use an example of a county that passed a well-thought out, effective zoning ordinance, first step was for the county court to appoint a county planning commission. The commission then met with local board members, county courts, extension specialists and economists from Oregon State University, and others, to obtain background information and to find out

how other areas had arrived at zoning ordinances.

The commissioners also met with the leadership in all incorporated cities of the county, to obtain assistance and advice in zoning areas surrounding these cities. Under state law and through the county court, they then adopted an interim ordinance that allowed them to do some zoning while the permanent, complete zoning ordinance was being prepared.

Land use maps that indicate the use of each piece of property in the county were prepared and used to establish guidelines for countywide zoning. The final step was to prepare a complete, countywide zoning ordinance, which was approved by the county court after a series of public hearings. The entire process took approximately six years. Union county is now one of two counties in the state with countywide zoning.

Columbia county's planning commission, appointed by the county court, is now in its seventh year. During this time the commission has studied and proposed ordinances for sub-divisions, a building code, and garbage disposal which were subsequently adopted by the court with some minor changes, indicates Walrod.

For more than two years now, the Columbia county planning commission has been studying and working toward the development of a zoning ordinance that would fit the southeastern portion of the county from Columbia City south to the county line. During this time they have had the assistance of the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon in the preparation of maps and other materials as well as in the drafting of the preliminary ordinances.

The commission is now approaching the time when it will be necessary to hold public hearings in regard to zoning of the area currently under consideration. Adoption will then be up to the county court.

Developments in other sections of the county, particularly Clatskanie, have emphasized the need for zoning in those areas of the county. The county planning commission is working toward conferences with the various city planning commissions relative to problems of mutual interest and an expansion of zoning activities into other sections of the county.
