## County Court Minutes - - -

Unofficial, subject to change before approval by the County Court.

April 13, 1966

The Columbia County Court having this day met in regular session for the purpose of transacting county business with the following members present: Judge Earl N. Seawright, Commissioners Louis J. Wasser and O. D. Clark, whereupon the following business was transacted:

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Miscellaneous claims were approved.

C. A. Wilson met with the court concerning purchase of land.

Bill Armstrong presented a petition signed by residents of the Clatskanie Public Utilities district requesting that a recreation district be formed in the Clatskanie area, the question be placed on the May 24 primary ballot. Said petition was accepted by the court pending necessary legal information.

Sheriff Roy S. Wilburn met with the court to request permission to purchase a file cabinet and two new chairs for the sheriff's office. Permission granted to use funds available in the 65-66 budget.

An order and deed were signed in favor of Sorenc Homes, Inc. for Lot 7, Block 120, City of St. Helens. Two orders and deeds were signed in favor of Robert A. and Rosemary Shampine for two parcels of property in Rainier.

County Clerk Roy A. Nelson met with the court to request the court's designation of date and time for opening bids received to furnish diesel oil and gas to the county. Commissioner Wasser moved and Commissioner Clark seconded that 2 p.m., May 18, gas and diesel bids be opened in the county court room county courthouse, St. Helens. Motion carried.

A petition signed by 68 residents of the surrounding area protesting the manner in which garbage is disposed of by the City of Clatskanie was received by the court, and referred to the county sanitarian.

A letter from Eric Carlson & Associates regarding pay ranges and scale of salary for county employees under civil service was received by the court.

Rental for house on the fairgrounds property in the amount of \$60 was received from R. Deahn, on April 6.

The February report from the State Public Welfare commission was received by the court.

A lease agreement between the court and the State Department of Forestry permitting the county to erect a tower and equipment shed for the road department's radio communications system, was signed by the court.

The court designated the St. Helens Sentinel - Mist as the official newspaper to publish notices of tax foreclosure during the year 1966.

The court received \$139 for two months rental of house on N. 16th street from Jay R. Austin agency.

The March minutes of the park commission were received by the court.

The court was advised that the U. S. Department of Commerce hand book of "Mathematical Functions" is available from the Department.

The offer of \$835 for Tax Lot 10 consisting of 6 acres near Rainier was received from Mrs. Ruth Hecker, 1333 NW 24th, Portland. Commissioner Wasser moved and Commissioner Clark seconded the court advise her no offer less than \$1000 will be considered. Motion carried.

District Attorney Donald L. Kalberer met with the court to present the proposed new forms of junk yard licenses.

## State Requests Beautification

In 1965, a federal highway beautification act was passed which seeks to eliminate the eyesore of junk yards and wrecking yards in areas adjacent to the interstate highway system. The responsibility has been passed to state highway departments and Oregon's department has in turn asked the aid of counties and cities.

The federal act defines junkyard as an establishment or place of business which is maintained for storage, buying and selling of junk, or operation of an automobile graveyard or a garbage dump. It further specifies that by January 1, 1968 all such places that are within one thousand feet of the nearest edge of the right-of-way and visible from the interstate system and primary system shall be screened by natural objects, plantings, fences or other appropriate means.

The act further provides that any state which does not effectively control such situations shall have its federal aid highway funds reduced until the condition is corrected.

In line with the action asked from counties, Judge Earl Seawright has outlined the requirements in a letter which he is delivering to owners of businesses which come under this act and is asking their cooperation in correcting the condition to comply with it. Attention is called also to the fact that such businesses will lose their licenses to operate if they fail to comply with the law.

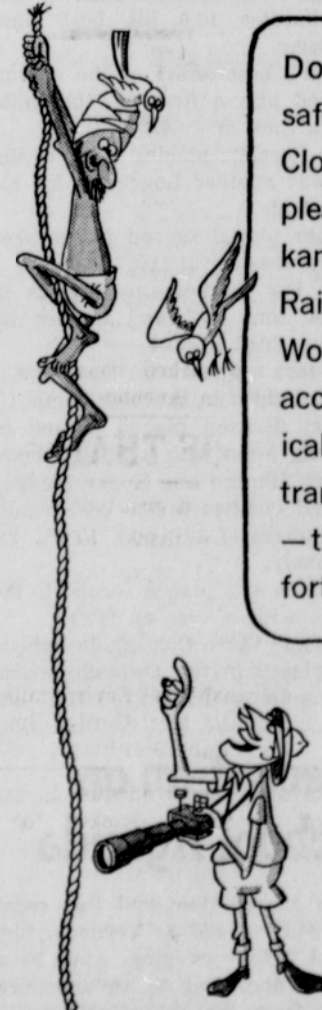
