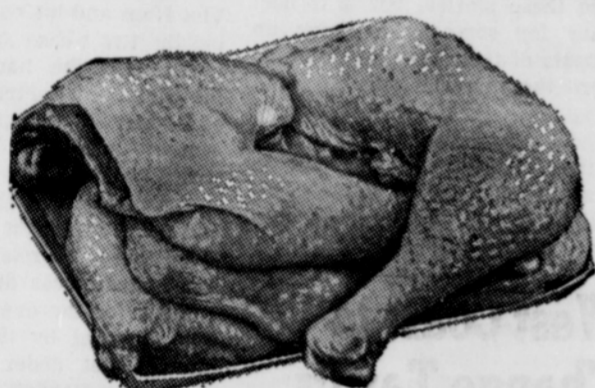

County Court Minutes ---

Unofficial, subject to change before approval by the County Court.

April 20, 1966

The Columbia County Court having met this day in regular session for the purpose of transacting county business with the following members present: Judge Earl N. Seawright, Commissioners Louis J. Wasser and O. D. Clark, whereupon the following business was transacted:

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved with corrections.

Commissioner Wasser moved and Commissioner Clark seconded to strike from the minutes of April 13, 1966 from the paragraph concerning formation of a recreation district in the Clatskanie area the following sentence: "the question be placed on the May 24th Primary Ballot". Motion carried. Mr. and Mrs. William Carson, Box 32, Clatskanie and other residents of the area, discussed with the court and roadmaster the oiling of Lindberg road. The roadmaster is to install a traffic counter and make recommendations to the court.

Mr. Wilder, courthouse janitor, discussed with the court the matter of purchasing janitorial supplies for the courthouse.

R. W. Fraser, chairman of supervisors of the Webb District Improvement company met with the court concerning the oiling of the road that passes the Emil Johnson property in that district. The matter was taken under advisement.

County Clerk Roy Nelson, discussed with the court attending the A.O.C. joint data processing committee meeting to be held on April 28 at Salem. Commissioner Clark moved and Commissioner Wasser seconded that the clerk and his accounting clerk attend this meeting. Motion carried.

Roy Nelson, county clerk, discussed with the court the matter of the bookkeepers salary in his office. The matter was taken under advisement.

Bill Christy, Crown Zellerbach, presented to the court an application for Crown Zellerbach to become a forest road contractor in the Chapman area. Matter was taken under advisement.

Commissioner Wasser moved and Commissioner Clark seconded that the court hold a meeting on April 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the county courtroom with the mayors of the various cities in the county relative to a city-county planner. Motion carried.

Lorra Lambert, health nurse, discussed with the court the matter of the home health agency (Medicare facilities) in Columbia county. Commissioner Clark moved and Commissioner Wasser seconded that the district attorney be instructed to draw a letter of intent to the state health department concerning the home health agency. Motion carried.

Commissioner Clark moved and Commissioner Wasser seconded that the offer of George Laws, Vernonia, for Lot 1, Broadway Addition in the city of Vernonia in the amount of \$50, and Block 7, Lot 3, 4 and 10, Central Addition in the City of Vernonia in the amount of \$650, and Block 3, Lots 3, 4 and 5, Sunrise Addition to the City of Vernonia for \$100 be taken under advisement. Motion carried.

Commissioner Wasser moved and Commissioner Clark seconded that the offer from Roland Curteman, Rainier, Oregon for Lots 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21, Block R, Roxy Park Addition to Rainier in the amount of \$850 be accepted. Motion carried.

Commissioner Wasser moved and Commissioner Clark seconded that the offer of Jacqueline Bishop, Rainier, in the amount of \$110 for Tax Lot 23, being strip of S. side of E½ of N.W¼, S. of Highway, be accepted. Motion carried.

The court signed an order increasing the dog license fees commencing with the year 1967. The fee for each male or spayed bitch dog will be \$2; fee for each female dog will be \$3. Licenses procured after March 1 will include an additional \$2 fee for each dog. Nothing further coming before the court, the meeting was adjourned until April 27, 1966.
