Angling Rules Set for 1967

Following a public hearing in Portland, the Oregon Game Commission adopted final angling regulations for 1967 which were almost identical to the tentative rules as proposed two weeks ago. The only changes made was the restoration of the boat fishing deadline on the Williamson river to its original site at highway 97 bridge.

Season dates for the general trout season will be April 22 to October 31 in all zones except streams in Zone 1, the high lakes, and Zones 3 and 4. Season dates for high lakes in the Cascades and Paulina Mountains and all coast streams in Zone 1 will be May 20 through October 31. Minor date changes were made in the trout season for the Rogue and Umpqua watersheds.

Of importance to steelhead fishermen was the upstream shifts in the winter deadlines on numerous streams, and removing the deadlines entirely on others. In addition the winter season was extended through March 31 on streams not already affected. Excellent returns of hatchery steelhead to most north coast streams influenced the commission's decision in allowing anglers a longer season as well as more fishing waters in which to try their skill.

Deadline shifts on the Rogue and tributaries will open up about 40 miles of stream for steelhead fishermen, and season dates will allow another month of fishing. Additional upstream tributaries were opened up to early trout fishing under the six-inch rules. In the Umpqua drainage, the steelhead and salmon deadline was removed from Smith river, and the fly-fishing-only deadline moved downstream to its old deadline at Rock Creek.

The Deschutes river was opened to salmon and steelhead fishing the year around from Sherars Falls to the Columbia. Hood River anglers were given a month's extension of the winter steelhead season on that stream, under the two-fish bag limit. As amended, the one-steelhead bag limit will apply from April 22 through October 31.

The commission upheld its earlier decision to restrict angling at Davis Lake to flies only, but advised that this decision would be reviewed again next year. Boat fishing restrictions were removed from the Miami, Kilchis, and Smith rivers. Other regulation changes included minor deadline shifts, date changes, and similar matters of a housekeeping nature. Regulations adopted by the commission for the 1967 season will become effective January 1.
