# Christmas Club **Checks Mailed**

Nearly \$2 billion has been sent to 15,400,000 Christmas shoppers in the United States who were members of Christmas clubs at financial institutions this past year, according to LeRoy B. Staver, president of U.S. National Bank of Oregon.

In making the announcement, Staver said that this was the most money ever paid out to Christmas Club members. He said that U. S. National issued checks totaling nearly \$2 million the past week to its Christmas club members. The total included interest earned on the accounts.

Surprisingly only \$755.5 million, or slightly more than 38 percent of the total savings from Christmas Clubs, will be spent for Christtmas gifts, while \$620 million will be put into permanent savings. The remainder is used for a variety of purposes ranging from winter vacations to the payment of taxes.

Not so surprising is the fact that seven out of every 10 Christmas club checks go to women since American women now handle 75 percent of family banking transactions

In a letter received by his mother Mrs. Harold Shipley, from T. Sgt. Jack Gates, Phu Cat, Viet Nam he says that weather there is around 85 degrees day time and 70 degrees at night. He mentions the fact that after living in the Sacramento area for several years, he is used to the heat, but it takes some of the boys a couple of months to get acclimatized.

When it rains it is fantastic, he states. It comes in big drops and it really rains hard, then it seems to break up and makes a mist, so it is almost impossible to see any thing. But so far the rains have only lasted about one hour and then it slacks off so things can move about again.

To quote from his letter: "I work in the control room, same as I did at Mathers A.F.B. - Control what aircraft will fly assign priorities to jobs and send the mechanics out to priority jobs first. All of the aircraft is on a board and know the status whether it needs parts work or what.

"We have radio and TV so things aren't too tough here!

"We have one aircraft set up for carrying wounded and when the Army calls for that we know they have been hit, but the helicopters bring them to the small strips then our caribous take them from the strips to the hospital. We get a lot of them in the hospital 30 minutes after they have been hit.

"We have another set up for relay of radio messages. This plane stands by. If the Army gets pinned down some where, we fly this one in with the big radios aboard. The Army calls the airplane and they relays messages for support or what they need and where. Mostly though we fly to An Khe and move Army troops in and out of trouble spots etc. We support the 1st Cavalry."
