## Inspections Due on Farm Worker Buses

Inspection of farm vehicles used to transport workers is now underway, the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division reported Tuesday. Inspections will continue throughout the spring and summer.

During last year's inspections, 78 percent of the vehicles inspected were found to be defective at time of inspection. The division urges farm vehicle owners to check vehicles now and get them in condition to avoid delays when the heavy harvest season begins.

Farm vehicles used to transport workers should meet minimum safety standards as described in the Safety Code booklet. The booklet is available free from field offices of the Motor Vehicles Division and the Oregon State Police.

**Hi-Lites in the History of Pharmacy**

In 1240, the German Emperor Fredrick II issued an edict that established pharmacy as an independent branch of the public welfare service.  
The three essentials were:  
1—Separation of the pharmaceutical from the medical profession.  
2—Official supervision of pharmaceutical prescriptions.  
3—Compulsory use of a prescribed formula.  
The first pharmacopoeia (lists of medicines and their preparation, properties and uses) to be published were not at all uniform. This exposed the public to much danger when powerful preparations were prescribed in one country and dispensed in another.
