But there may be a solution to the problem. It has been suggested by some that the Rural Fire District take in the city. Then the city would be out of the fire fighting business altogether and the residents would still receive the benefits of being covered by an adequate fire fighting unit.

At the present time all of this is in the thought stage, but I think that it is a very good thought. As of now, the rural district does not have any more money than the city for fire facilities, however, the thing that they do have is a much broader tax base and only one thing to spend their money for. The city of course, must divide its monies into a lot of different piles to cover the cost of many services which we get from the city.

This merger, if it occurs, would have to be decided first by the rural fire board then by the city council and then by a vote of the people. If such a vote should be taken, I urge you to find out all you can about the advantages and disadvantages of the merger.

I personally think with the facts that I have at this time, the merger would be advantageous to all concerned.

KAO Adopts Theme for Fund Drive

"Your Gift Means Life" is the theme for the third annual statewide fund-raising drive recently launched by the Kidney Association of Oregon to obtain \$200,000. The money will be used during 1972 to continue the life-saving program of 24 KAO patients throughout the state now on artificial kidney machines and to expand the program to add new patients next year.

The theme, "Your Gift Means Life," tells dramatically the vital need for money by the Kidney Association to continue to save the lives of its present patients and to have enough money on hand to be able to admit at least one new Oregon patient each month who develops kidney failure.

Chuck Foster, Executive Director of the Kidney Association, declared that, "Most people faced with death because of kidney failure, cannot afford the extremely high costs of kidney machines, training, treatment on the machine in their homes and the cost of necessary medical supplies."

Foster pointed out that the cost of training, equipment and home supplies for each new KAO patient is about \$10,000. After this period, the cost per day of maintaining the life of each patient on an artificial kidney machine is \$12 or an average of approximately \$4,000 per year.

The function of the Kidney Association of Oregon is to raise funds in order that patients may continue treatment, which will allow them to work, raise families and be useful people.

Foster emphasized that, "We have the medical know-how to save the lives of kidney failure victims and to rehabilitate them. There is no shortage of artificial kidney machines. The only shortage we have," he said, "is money."

Thrifty Meals Topic For Study Groups

Stretching the food dollar to its maximum without sacrificing appeal or nutrition is the subject of discussion in the extension study groups this month. Leaders from the 14 Columbia County extension study groups attended a training session on thrifty meals in December. Margaret Palen, Extension Agent in Tillamook County showed participants how to compare their food costs with average low-cost plans, and gave guides for planning imaginative low-cost meals for different situations.

The average family of four spends \$27.40 a week on a low-cost food plan, according to USDA estimates. With school age children, this amount increases to \$31.90. These estimates are for food only; they do not include the many non-food items frequently purchased in the grocery stores.

Keeping the food budget at the low-cost level requires skillful planning and shopping. Compared to moderate and liberal plans, the low-cost plan includes more potatoes, dry beans and peas, and flour and cereals. Meats, dairy products, fruits, and vegetables are essential to a balanced diet, but by choosing those with low costs per serving and by serving them in only the necessary amounts, the food budget can be held in check.

Imagination in preparation can turn the most humble foods to a gourmet's delight. Combining and seasoning foods imaginatively can be the key to avoiding monotony when serving the same low-cost food regularly. Even the lowly potato can be dressed up in at least a hundred ways.

Women who wish to learn more about preparing meals on a limited budget are welcome to attend the study group meetings, says Carol Ashley, Columbia County Extension Agent. Leaders who attended the training session will be presenting lessons on thrifty meals throughout the county in January. Call or write to the Extension Office, Courthouse, St. Helens for the date and location of meetings in your area.
