OBITUARY

Mrs. Blanche Lundgren, 73, who made her home on Timber Route for twenty eight years before moving to Vernonia four years ago, died January 3rd at the Forest Grove Community Hospital following an illness of the past several years.

Funeral services for Mrs. Lundgren were held at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel, Vernonia with the Rev. John Owens and Elder Leo Bellville, present and former pastors of the Baptist Church in Vernonia officiating. Concluding rites and interment were at the Vernonia Memorial Cemetery with Bill Horn, Paul Weidman, Albert Tandy Ray Gaffney, Larry Garner and John Steele serving as pall bearers.

Mrs. Lundgren was born at Weisert, Nebraska on November 12, 1898, the daughter of Ansel R. and Phoebe Manning Hinkley. She spent her early life and received her education at Lincoln, Omaha and St. Paul, Nebraska and then was united in marriage to Fred O. Lundgren at Fremont, Nebraska on May 15, 1926. They lived their early married years at Omaha and in Illinois and then moved to New Mexico for almost ten years. In the early 1940's they came to this area and lived on their farm home on Timber route, moving thence to their present home in Vernonia.

Surviving in addition to her husband is a son, Fred Lundgren, Jr.; Glynco, Georgia two grandchildren, Randy Lundgren, Great Lakes, Illinois and Carol Lundgren, Glynco; and a sister, Mrs. Lulu White, Delta, Colorado.
