58 Percent of Goal Reached By County

Savings Bonds sales in the state of Oregon continue to show increasing strength. State Chairman Thomas Prideaux announced that the state's sales have exceeded the \$4 million mark.

While revealing the United States Treasury figures, Prideaux pointed with pride to the fact that at this accelerated rate, Oregon would exceed its budgeted quota by \$8 million. In light of the fact that Oregon led the nation last year in percentage of goal attained and was assigned a huge increase in quota, the sales figures are most gratifying.

Prideaux feels that the stimulated activity in Savings Bonds sales must be attributed to public awareness of the investment value of bonds. At the new 5 1/2 percent interest rate if held to maturity of 5 years and 10 months, coupled with an exemption from state and local taxes Savings Bonds are an attractive package.

The May sales raised Oregon's year-to-date sales to \$21,170,962 or 53 percent of the annual goal of \$39,900,000.

Columbia County, under chairman R.A. Severson reported \$49,972 in May sales. With the 1972 goal for the county set at \$550,000, Columbia County has reached \$317,933 or 58 percent of its goal for the year.

Nationally, the sale of \$546 million of Series E bonds established a 27-year record for any May and pushed the cash value of bonds outstanding over the \$56 billion mark for the first time in history.

Openings Still Available For Late-Deciding Students

Have you put off the decision about entering college this fall? About transferring to another school? There is still time—but not much.

Some 15,936 openings still remain in Oregon colleges and universities for late-deciding freshmen and 11th hour transfer students, according to a May survey conducted by the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE).

According to the WICHE study, application deadlines for the fall semester range from July 1 to September 29 at 30 Oregon higher education institutions.

An open door admissions policy is becoming increasingly popular among western colleges. Nineteen institutions reported open admissions for this fall. College officials point out, however, that vacancies are open only to students who meet the individual college's entrance requirements. And if a student has already applied to a college or university and has been turned down, he should not reapply at that college.

The WICHE study, which canvassed 458 undergraduate institutions throughout the 13 western states, reports that approximately 146,000 vacancies are still available for entering freshmen and transfer students. A total of 287

western institutions responded to the survey, with 237 reporting vacancies for come-lately applicants.

The following two-year colleges in Oregon have openings for commuting and dormitory freshmen and transfer students: Clatsop Community College, Astoria, deadline open; Concordia College, Portland, August 15; Judson Baptist College, Portland, September 1; and Treasure Valley Community College, Ontario, September 29. Vacancies for commuting freshmen and transfer students are at: Central Oregon Community College, Bend, September 24, deadline; Clackamas Community College, Oregon City, September 25; Lane Community College, Eugene, September 29; Linn-Benton Community College, Albany, September 30; Mt. Hood Community College, Gresham, September 20; Portland Community College, September 1; Southwestern Oregon Community College, Coos Bay, September 22; and Umpqua Community College, Roseburg, September 15.

The following four-year universities have openings for commuting and dormitory freshmen and transfer students: Columbia Christian College, Portland, September 1 deadline; Eastern Oregon College, La Grande, September 1; Linfield College, McMinnville (no dorms for freshmen men), June 1; Marylhurst College (women only), August 1; Northwest Christian College, Eugene, September 15; Oregon State University, Corvallis, August 15; University of Oregon, Eugene, August 15; Southern Oregon College, Ashland, August 15; Warner Pacific College, Portland, August 15; and Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, September 15.

Vacancies for dormitory freshmen and transfer students are at: George Fox College, Newberg, September 1 deadline; and Mt. Angel Seminary (men only), St. Benedict, August 1. Vacancies for commuting freshmen and transfer students at Portland State University, September 18 deadline; and for commuting freshmen at Reed College, Portland, date not given.

Details on vacancies in colleges and universities throughout the 13 western states are available from: College Vacancy Survey, WICHE, P.O. Drawer P Boulder, Colorado 80502.

WICHE is a public agency which helps the 13 western states work together to increase educational opportunities for western youth, to improve programs of universities and colleges, to expand the supply of specialized manpower, and to inform the public of higher education needs.
