**MRS. EMMA HANSEN**

Mrs. Emma Hansen, 74, who had been a resident of the Vernonia area since 1939, died at the family home at 558 Madison Avenue in Vernonia early Thursday morning July 6th. Mrs. Hansen's death was unexpected although she had been hospitalized during the past month.

Funeral services for Mrs. Hansen were held at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel, Vernonia Saturday July 8th at 1 p.m. The Rev. Jack Carlson, pastor of the Evangelical Church of Vernonia conducted the services with Mrs. Lloyd Thomas, organist. Concluding rites and interment were at the Vernonia Memorial Cemetery with Mr. Horn, Loren Stiff, Harry Culbertson, Tom Tomlin, Cass Bergerson and Albin Bergstrom serving as pall bearers.

Mrs. Hansen was a native of Turner, Oregon where she was born January 9, 1898, the daughter of the late Gustav and Caroline Pfaffle Drager. She spent all of her early life in that area and was united in marriage to Willard Ingermanson at Vancouver, Washington on August 21, 1931. They lived first in Portland and then six years at Banks before moving to a home on Timber route in 1939. Mr. Ingermanson preceded her in death here in 1966.

She was united in marriage to Hans O. Hansen at Vancouver, Washington on June 25, 1968 and a short time later moved to their present home in Vernonia.

Surviving is her husband, Hans O. Hansen, Vernonia; two brothers, Ed Drager, Salem; and Sam Drager, Aumsville, Oregon; and six sisters, Mrs. Hilda Price, Mrs. Marie Langley, Mrs. Irving B. (Rose) Lincoln and Carolyn Clark, all of Portland; Mrs. Ruth Feitelson, Salem; and Mrs. Henry (Pearl) Feller, Turner, Oregon and six nieces and nephews.

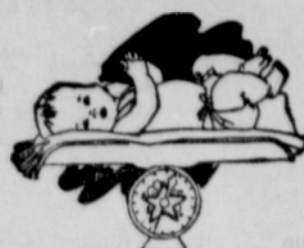
Mrs. George Scott visited last Monday at the Tornblads.
