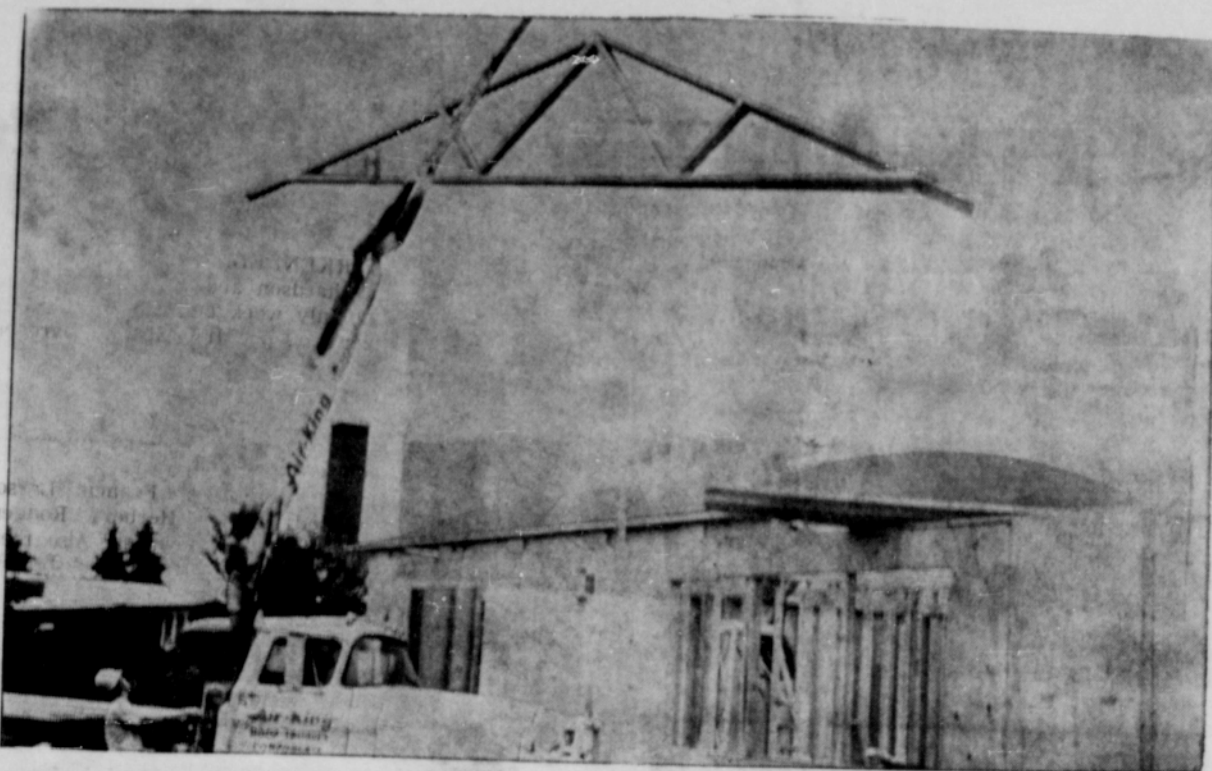
Highlight of the business meeting will be installation of new officers.

More than 50 log truckers, wives and guests from Clatsop, Columbia and Washington counties are expected to attend the event which will begin with a social hour at 7 p.m., followed by a no-host dinner and business meeting.

Also, to be discussed is the OLTA convention held in conjunction with the Western Regional Log Truckers Expo at the Sheraton Hotel, Portland, August 4-6. Chapter members will consider and formulate a position on items of business coming before the association for action at the convention.

Included is consideration of a resolution requesting that log truckers be permitted to haul Saturday afternoons and Sunday during the summer season. They are now prohibited from hauling on those days between Memorial Day and Labor Day.

Appointments are also expected to be made of men to fill chairmanships of eight standing committees: Environmental Quality and Conservation, Insurance, Safety, Governmental Affairs, Budget and Finance, Administration, Tariff Bureau, and Membership Members Services. The chairmen appointed will represent the chapter at the state meetings to be held 8 a.m., Saturday, August 5, at the Sheraton Hotel in Portland.

Forestry Tour Visits Vernonia Tues. July 18

Enjoy a day long bus tour to one of the west's great Tree Farms according to Ernest Kolbe, Forestry Center's Director. The centers July 18 tour is scheduled to visit Crown-Zellerbach's Tree Farm near Vernonia. This, says Kolbe, is a great example of modern forestry at work. Intensive forest management, he says, here is exciting to observe in operation. On display are most modern log skidders that handle whole trees so that they can be skillfully cut into logs to meet the needs of products to be produced. A 300 foot long log tank, according to Kolbe, is used for sorting logs of various lengths and grades. Also huge log stackers are in operation to "deck" the 26 different sortings. Cedar shingle mills and a saw mill are other attractions.

Above all the scenery is superb and alone worth the trip according to Kolbe. Costs for the bus trip including lunch is \$6 per person. Forestry guides will explain the operations and answer questions. Reservations are handled in order received. Call the Forestry Center 228-1367 early to be sure of space. The tour begins at the Western Forestry Center at 9 a.m. and returns about 5 p.m.
